#### **THE DEMANDS OF DISCIPLESHIP**

Today we encounter readings that already have a Lenten feel about them. Nineveh undergoes a forty-day fast, the psalmist reminds us that God alone can show sinners the way, Paul shows us how fleeting the things and events of this world are, and Jesus cries out "Repent!" before he calls his new followers. "Come after me," Jesus says, but if we are to truly live out the commands and demands of our discipleship through baptism, we must first know our need for conversion, our repentance, our need to believe in the gospel fully. Today's Gospel opens with the stark reminder of what befell John the Baptist for completely living out his vocation as the herald of Christ and the gospel: he was arrested, imprisoned, and martyred. Though few of us will experience consequences that extreme, we must all be ready to risk some sort of rejection as, heeding the call of Jesus, we live out the kingdom of God at hand, repent of our sins, and believe in the good news of salvation.

#### **TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION**

One of the most unusual Catholic churches in the world is in Amsterdam: Our Lord in the Attic. What looks like a beautiful narrow brick mansion alongside a canal is a clever disguise for a very well-preserved 17th-century home and a secret church. During the Reformation, the Netherlands was divided into Protestant Holland and the Spanish Netherlands, now known as Belgium, a Catholic stronghold. Protestant reformers seized all the Catholic parishes in Holland and "de-Catholicized" them. New laws forbade the celebration of the Mass in public. St. Nicholas Church was renamed "Old Church" by the new owners, and the dispossessed Catholics got to work "hiding" St. Nicholas Parish in the upper floors of this mansion. Other Catholics did the same thing, but this is the only hidden church that survives today. Sunday Mass is still celebrated here.

It's a beautiful hideaway, with nothing spared in regard to marble, gilding, a pipe organ, and classic Dutch painting. A few steps away, the Old Church, begun in 1250, stands emptied of the statues, carvings, and windows of its Catholic days. The new tenants gave up when it came to the ceiling, which is still painted with saints and biblical scenes. Catholicism was at last tolerated in Holland after 1853, but in 1924 when the International Eucharistic Congress was held in Amsterdam, processions of Catholics were still forbidden in the streets. Today, Roman Catholics are about 19 percent of the population, and there's no need for any of them to hide in the attic.

# PARISH PASTORAL COUNCIL Minutes of December 14, 2017 Meeting

The Renew My Church prayer was offered to begin the meeting by Fr. Ryan.

#### 1. Fix It Campaign

a. Doug Samz distributed a worksheet showing the \$1.7 million budget, indicating items completed through today's date, the cost and savings on each project, and projects that are still open. Because of the significant cost savings, additional projects were able to be completed that were not in the initial plan which included replacing the roofs on the west side and chapel of the church, installing a new HVAC unit in the church, and the installation of new safety doors and related accessories at the parish school and religious education ministry.

Other projects planned for 2018 include the demolition and removal of the old church, construction of a new storage building, installation of new church flooring, and repaving the west parking lot. There is an expected shortfall even if all the pledges made so far are received in full. The Parish needs more pledges. Everything done to date is paid for, and the parish will pay as the projects are completed. Less than 700 families have pledged from the total of 4,500 families. \$1625 is the average pledge per family. \$333,000 still has to be collected from donors. Father Ryan would like everything done by June 30<sup>th</sup>. It is important to note that the Parish eliminated the previous \$3.8 million debt without any capital campaigns, which allowed for the parish to initiate the Fix-It Capital Campaign in May 2017.

b. Jason Sfire distributed the handout that he had provided at the September meeting and went through and discussed the before and after pictures of each completed project which included: new roofs on the church and ministry center, new siding on the ministry center, the new parking lots at the ministry center and front of school, new landscaping, new curbs at school, the removal of the pipe bollards, additional four feet of sidewalk at the school, new roof over chapel, and updated school security with bullet proof glass. Jason Sfire also announced that every door at the school will have 3M film installed to prevent forced entry. The Ministry Center and Father Valker Hall basement windows will also eventually be done.

Jason Sfire pointed out the main reason for the savings was due to *value engineering*, which is finding a more efficient way to complete a project.

#### 2. Evangelization through Intentional Discipleship

a. Pam Urban and Judy Reilly presented on EQUIP (Intentional Discipleship) on behalf of Pam Lynch who is visiting her daughter in Florida.

Pam began by discussing how this group began in June 2016 when it was announced in the church bulletin and parishioners were invited to attend a one day workshop. Sherry Weddell and Deacon Keith Strohm were the lead speakers. After that workshop, a core group was formed. Deacon Strohm is now a partner with our Parish. Every Tuesday for eight months the group of about 50 parishioners attends from 7 – 9 pm. Many people have been inquiring about joining this discipleship. The core group is hoping to start another group in early Fall 2018.

# b. Judy Reilly provided the council with a summary of the discipleship group and its purpose. She discussed what intentional discipleship is and that an intentional disciple is one who has given his life over to Jesus and who has entrusted him or herself to Jesus and actively pursues him. Judy said that this has always been the mission of the church. Ways of how to develop a relationship with Jesus are outlined in the handout that was distributed. Judy also discussed how it is difficult to reach out to our culture now and that Deacon Strohm said this generation can relate to personal experience and our stories.

Judy discussed where the group is currently and that they are being taught to assess where people are in their faith journey. People are excited, and the knowledge they are gaining is moving from their heads to their hearts. There is the spirit of multiplication. If each person that is touched by this evangelization brings two or three others into the next group, this discipleship will multiply. They are discussing ways how to integrate intentional discipleship to parish ministries.

#### 3. Update on the Parish School Marketing Plan

Tom Purtell and Marty Bush distributed a handout for the parish school 2017 – 2018 Marketing Plan. The marketing team hopes to achieve 1% enrollment growth in the 2018 - 2019 school year, which equates to enrolling a total of 75 new students. They want to maintain a growth environment and discussed reducing the cost barrier strategy with four main programs: Tuition referral, introductory tuition discount, donor funded aid, and Illinois tax credit scholarships. Details of each program are in the handout they distributed. Introductory tuition discount and donor funded aid are needs based.

Applications for the Illinois Tax Credit scholarships will in January. There will be a big push to market these programs from January to April. Aide will be given on first come, first serve basis. <u>Unfortunately, Lake Zurich is not a focus area</u>. Tom Purtell or Marty Bush will find out if donors can earmark their contributions to a specific school rather than a region.

School Principal Kyle Schmitt indicated that the Blue Ribbon application will be finished and submitted on December 15 from the school to the U.S. Department of Education.

Father Ryan conveyed appreciation for Kyle Schmitt as the Principal with his Catholic faith, leadership, vision, vigor, positive approach, teamwork approach, curriculum development, teachers' formation development and accountability, student interactions, communication, collaboration, and collegiality. Father Ryan also expressed appreciation that Marty Bush, School Board Chair from 2006 – 2012, and Thomas Purtell, current PPC Chair, are involved in the marketing and development of the parish school as well as advisors to the Principal.

There will be a push during Catholic Schools Week in January to attract new students. The three year old Pre-School is a significant challenge because it involves bringing in new students. Re-enrollment starts the week of January 15, and there will be a personal email invitation to a tour during Catholic Schools Week sent to Parish families with children entering Preschool and Kindergarten as well as to all Religious Education families. The marketing group is putting together an information sheet and will send out a targeted postcard mailing to certain Volo, Lake Zurich, Mundelein and Indian Creek residents in mid-January. They realize that St. Francis is competing with public schools that offer free full time kindergarten.

#### 4. Update on the Emergency Operation Plan

Father Ryan indicated that on January 24, a FBI agent will come to the Parish to give a presentation to the community on having an emergency operation plan. Deputy Chief Tom Hardy from the Fire Department will assist with this presentation. Hopefully, the parish can network with Good Shepherd Hospital and the Village of Lake Zurich to provide active shooter training. The parish is also working with Deputy Chief Johnson from the Police Department and Joseph Pasquesi, a former FBI agent and a parishioner, to assist with the implementation of an emergency operation plan. A core group of teachers met with Laura Angelini and Father Ryan last year to discuss security at school and provided leadership which helped start this initiative under the direction of the Archdiocese of Chicago. The Parish will keep revisiting this issue and making improvements as necessary. Security still needs to be reviewed at the Ministry Center, Youth Ministry, Religious Education Ministry, and the Church. This will be an ongoing process. Pam Urban voiced her concern regarding parents opening the security door for other parents, and Kyle said he would address this issue at the school.

#### 5. Director of Religious Education

Father Ryan announced that in mid-January, Kathy Brady-Murfin will be leaving our parish to take on a new position as Vocation Director for the United States Province of the Servants of the Holy Heart of Mary in Kankakee. She asks for our prayers as she takes on this challenging role. The parish is grateful for the 11 years that Kathy Brady-Murfin directed our religious education ministry.

Father Ryan concluded the meeting with a closing prayer.

The Lake Zurich Fire and Police Departments in partnership with St. Francis de Sales Catholic Church are hosting a Targeted Violence: Pre-Attack Behaviors and Indicators presentation by Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) David Young on **Wednesday, January 24 at 6 p.m. in Fr. One of the likely aftereffects is that the representatives would be able to bring the information back to other personnel at their school, business, or association regarding what to look for and/or report suspicious persons or activity.

# A CALL FOR CATHOLIC EDUCATION

The following speech was addressed to the St. Francis de Sales Parish community and was written and delivered by Mr. Kyle Schmitt, M.A. Ed. (SFS Parish School Principal) at Masses during the weekend of July 29-30, 2017.

Thank you, Father Ryan, for inviting me to speak today. I appreciate the opportunity to address all of you about what I believe is a very important issue: education, and in particular, Catholic education. I want to do 4 things:

I want to tell you some facts about our school.

I want to tell you about our mission and purpose and how that differentiates us from the public schools. I want to make a plea for the importance of Catholic education generally. And then I want to end with an invitation.

#### Facts about our School

I want to start out with some facts about St. Francis de Sales Parish School.

We serve children from age 3 until 8th grade with a preschool—8th grade program.

We have an enrollment of over 350 students—which makes us one of the larger PreK-8 schools in the Archdiocese. Our average class size is less than 22 students.

Our single student tuition for grades K-8 is \$4,055, which is the lowest published tuition rate for Archdiocesan schools in the region. The regional average is over \$5,000.

We won the national Blue Ribbon award for school excellence in 2007. Only the top 10% of schools in the country received that award.

We are an Illinois State Board of Education recognized school.

We are a national accredited school through the AdvancED organization for continuous school improvement. This summer, our 8th grade graduates scored in the 57th percentile of all incoming freshmen at Carmel Catholic High School, which is just one piece of evidence that our student academic outcomes are, on average, stronger than the schools around us.

I could go on, but more important than the facts about the school are the reasons why the school exists.

#### Mission and Purpose of Our School and How that Differentiates Itself from Other Schools

Our mission is to *create a community of faith in which students, teachers, and parents live the message of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, share knowledge in a spirit of freedom and love, and cultivate service to God and neighbor.* I love that mission statement, don't you? If even half the students in the country graduated from a school with a mission statement like that, can you imagine what our country could be like? For comparison, the mission statement from Community Unit School District 95 is to *"empower every learner to achieve personal excellence."* That is also an excellent mission, but I think those two very different mission statements show how different we are from public schools.

The initial response I sometimes get from prospective parents considering enrolling their kids at our school is, "Why should we pay tuition to attend this school when the public schools have good academics and they are free?" Father Ryan and I are aligned in that we want to only speak positively about the public schools around St. Francis. So my answer is always focused on what **differentiates** St. Francis and I use two ideas: the first is **Catholic ontology** and the second is **Catholic community**. By ontology I mean our conception of a human being. We are called to be Christ for one another and to see Christ in one another. When we look at a child, we see a gift from God. We know that God has a plan for that child's life that we want to help them discover and live. We want college, career, AND heaven. When you look at a child as a gift from God, when you part of a small community and you know that child and their family the way you think about, talk about, and act towards that child can be very different. In public schools, the ontology is different. Large schools rely on numerical identification, student IDs, and you would get in trouble as a teacher if you invoke God or Christ. The implications of this difference in ontology show up in how we treat our students, what we teach our students, and how we handle behavioral concerns to name just a few domains.

If you have any doubt as to the significance of Catholic ontology, consider that according to Pew Research Center, 80% of the religiously unaffiliated believe that abortion should be legal in **most or all circumstances**. 80%. The number is obviously far lower for those identifying as Catholics.

The second differentiator, connected to the first, is Catholic community. I can tell from even this short month I've been here that this is a community with lots of rich relationships and many connections spanning long periods of time. I want to be a part of that. I want my daughters to be a part of that. I think everyone benefits who is already a part of it. Another reason I think this Catholic community is important is educational.

Educators talk about two types of curriculum: there is the **visible** curriculum which is what is taught in classes and there is the **invisible** curriculum, or, the hidden curriculum, which is what kids learn from social groups, and from inferring beliefs from observing behaviors of those around them. We know that older children, adolescents, and teenagers learn as much or more from their social groups as from their parents, teachers, and other adults. The hidden curriculum is powerful. As a parent, I do not want my daughters forming their opinions about all sorts of social and political issues by absorbing them from the wider society. I'd rather they absorb them from members of a Catholic community.

Those are the reasons I personally believe that Catholic education is well-worth the investment. The reasons that other parents tell me when explaining their interest in our school include the Catholic elements I discussed, especially the community piece (voiced by parishioners and children of alumni), as well as specific Catholic religious instruction, the discipline that kids learn at a Catholic school (sometimes people reference the uniform). Some want to get away from bullying and hazing they have experienced in other schools. I think those are all good reasons to send kids to Catholic schools, and in particular, our school.

However, St. Francis de Sales is not necessarily the best choice for everyone. The fact is that because of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, the public-school district can and does invest more resources into special education and educating students with disabilities than we can at St. Francis. Still, for the vast majority of students, I believe St. Francis School is the ideal option.

#### <u>A Plea for the Importance of Catholic Education</u>

I don't think we've been continually making the case for the essentiality of Catholicism as well as we could be. In 2007, two psychologists, one from Princeton and one from Stanford published a journal article titled, "Psychological Essentialism of Human Categories." In it, the authors identified all the ways in which we categorize ourselves and others, and determined which categories we use to ground our identity, and to determine who we interact with and befriend. The top five categories that were highly essential were, in order: gender, ethnicity, race, disability, and age. Religion was 8th, right beneath sexual orientation and language. So that is the average innate human nature of wider society.

Now to compare that with what we believe, I'll use Galatians 3:28. "There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Jesus Christ." And more recently and locally, *All for One and One for All in Jesus Christ.* That is the call and the challenge: to make our parish our most important community and choosing the parish school is one way of doing that. Remember that Jesus wants us to have a personal relationship with Him, but also He wants us to have a relationship with the Church and each other. John 13: 34-35 says, "A new commandment I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so also you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are My disciples, if you love one another." You can only give and receive God's love in community with others!

#### **Invitation**

So thank you very much for hearing my plea for Catholic education. I want to end with an invitation if you believe in the value of Catholic education as I do. If you have a school-aged child, I invite you to consider sending them to the parish school. If you know of other people, parishioners, neighbors, friends, relatives...I invite you to encourage them to consider sending their kids to the parish school. The school appreciates the financial support of the parish, so please continue to be generous in your support. I'll end with Matthew 19:14, when Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these."

Dear Parishioners,

As a reminder of what has been accomplished since May, the parking lots, paved areas, curbs, and sidewalks of the St. Francis de Sales Campus—including our Church and School—have now been completed. The new siding on the Ministry Center roof has also been installed. Repairs have been made to the Chapel roof on the Church, which began to seriously leak along the south wall of the Chapel during the spring and summer rainstorms. In addition to the Chapel roof, the slanted roof above the back sacristy and Music Room has been fixed. It had been leaking for a number of years.

As pledges are made and paid, we will continue to address the remaining projects, which can be found on our parish website. See what this good parish has accomplished already in total pledges and number of donors! At this point in the Campaign, 716 donors helped us reach \$1,192,319 in total pledges. Total pledges paid are \$921,365. Balance due is \$270,954. It is <u>not</u> the intention of the Fix-It Campaign to place the parish in debt. As a parish, we spent 9 years paying off the \$3.8 million debt. We will only address the projects as we raise the funds to pay for them. As Thomas Jefferson advised, "Never spend your money before you have it!" My Grandmother Ryan said the same message in her own way!

Thank you to those who have already responded with a pledge toward the <u>\$1.7 million goal</u>. St. Francis de Sales has a long history of generous giving. I respectfully ask for the prayers, involvement, and sacrifice of many, if not all, in the parish in making a pledge towards the Fix-It Campaign in addition to the generosity you provide each Sunday offering. **For example, if 1,000 parishioners pledge the suggested amount of \$850 per year for 2 years, we will reach our campaign goal immediately to conclude the projects.** Please, everyone, participate through a prayer and a pledge. All the funds we raise in the Fix-It Campaign stay within the parish.

I want to express my gratitude to Deacon John Sfire, Jason Sfire, and Amie Paige of The Fidelity Group for doing an extensive study of our parish campus, as was presented in the Fix-It Campaign presentation. I have asked the Fidelity Group, under the leadership of Deacon John Sfire and Jason Sfire, to serve as Project Managers of the Fix-It Campaign. # **CHARITABLE GIVING OPTIONS**

As you discern whether or how much to contribute to the Fix-It Campaign, please consider the tax advantaged methods, under existing tax law, for making charitable contributions with appreciated property or through your Individual Retirement Account (IRA) highlighted below. ### LONG-TERM CAPITAL GAIN PROPERTY

You can usually deduct the full fair market value of appreciated long-term assets you've held for more than one year, such as stocks, bonds, real estate, or mutual funds. For example, the full fair market value of publicly traded securities is the average of the high-low price on the date of transfer. What's more, there's no capital gains tax.

A wrinkle here is that the deduction is limited to 30% of your adjusted gross income (AGI) instead of the usual 60% limit for donations of cash and short-term property made to public charities - though you can still carry forward unused deductions for five years.

If you choose to deduct your cost basis only, you can raise the limit to 60% of your AGI. But if you're holding securities with a loss, it's better to sell first, take the capital loss for tax purposes, and then donate the cash. Keep in mind, in most cases, donating appreciated securities can be a cost-effective way to benefit the Fix-It Campaign.

#### TAX BREAK FOR IRA OWNERS

An IRA owner who is age 70.5 or over can directly transfer, tax-free, up to \$100,000 per year to an eligible charitable organization. Eligible IRA owners can take advantage of this provision regardless of whether they itemize their deductions. Distributions from employer-sponsored retirement plans, including SIMPLE IRAs and simplified employee pension (SEP) plans, are not eligible.

To qualify, the funds must be contributed directly by the IRA trustee to St. Francis de Sales Parish. These amounts are not taxable and no deduction is available for the amount given to the charity.

Transferred amounts are counted in determining whether the owner has met the IRA's required minimum distribution rules.


