

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The cathedral is a treasure in a diocese and in our tradition. It is not simply a "big church," as some say; some parish churches are larger. What makes a cathedral is the presence of the chair, called a *cathedra* (Latin for seat) reserved for the bishop.

There are many instances in our country of a local church (diocese) outgrowing a cathedral. In Baltimore and St. Louis, the former cathedrals are historic treasures in the heart of the old city, but new and larger structures now function as the seat of the bishop.

When a bishop dies or retires, it is said that "the seat is vacant," and when the new bishop is installed, the central ritual is the moment when the decree of the Holy Father is read and the new bishop is escorted to the *cathedra*. No one but the bishop sits in the *cathedra* during a ritual, but in Los Angeles the *cathedra* in the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels is accessible, and no one seems to mind when a visitor tries the *cathedra* out for the bishop's point of view.

14TH PLEDGE UPDATE AND REPAIRS COMPLETED

Sunday, June 3, 2018 Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Dear Parishioners.

As a reminder of what has been accomplished since May 2017, the parking lots, paved areas, curbs, and sidewalks of the St. Francis de Sales Campus—including our Church and School—have now been completed. The new siding on the Ministry Center roof has also been installed. Repairs have been made to the Chapel roof on the Church, which began to seriously leak along the south wall of the Chapel during the spring and summer rainstorms. In addition to the Chapel roof, the slanted roof above the back sacristy and Music Room has been fixed. It had been leaking for a number of years. The next initiative has begun. On May 15, the installation of the new heating and air conditioning system for the Ministry Center, now scheduled to be completed in early June.

As pledges are made and paid, we will continue to address the remaining projects, which can be found on our parish website. See what this good parish has accomplished already in total pledges and number of donors! At this point in the Campaign, 801 donors helped us reach \$1,254,160 in total pledges. Total pledges paid are \$1,090,133. Balance due is \$163,977. It is not the intention of the Fix-It Campaign to place the parish in debt. As a parish, we spent 9 years paying off the \$3.8 million debt. We will only address the projects as we raise the funds to pay for them. As Thomas Jefferson advised, "Never spend your money before you have it!" My Grandmother Ryan said the same message in her own way!



I also want to offer my appreciation for the guidance and involvement of Tom Purtell, Chair of the Parish Pastoral Council (PPC), Marty Bush, Member of the PPC; Mike Carlino, Chair of the Parish Finance Council; Doug Samz, Member of the Parish Finance Council; Christine DePrez, Cornerstone Bank Liaison; Laura Angelini, Business Manager; and Pam Lynch, Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministries.

MEMORIAL DAY 2018

On Memorial Day, Monday, May 28, 2018, many in the community attended the Memorial Day parade and subsequent Memorial Day ceremony at the Veterans Monument to pay tribute to and honor the Fallen of all five branches of the U.S. military. For the past 12 years, Father Ryan has offered the opening prayer for the ceremony. U.S. Navy Command Master Chief Sam Robinson of the Great Lakes Naval Station served as a guest speaker for the ceremony, and Mayor Tom Poynton offered a Memorial Day speech, which follows below. The Lake Zurich High School Band provided appropriate music for the ceremony and a Lake Zurich Fire Department firefighter played *Amazing Grace* on bagpipes. The Boy Scouts were a part of the Honor Guard in the laying of the wreath before the monument, during which Taps was played. Thank you to American Legion Lake Zurich Post #964 for organizing the service, serving as master of ceremonies, and providing lunch at the hall afterwards. Mayor Tom Poynton's speech follows.

Good Morning...and Welcome to Lake Zurich and today's Memorial Day ceremony.

First off...How about **Josh Thompson** and the **Lake Zurich High School Marching Band**...they are out here every Memorial Day...rain, sleet, snow, or sometimes like today in sweltering heat...you will hear more from them in a bit. Thank you LZHS Band!

I am **again** honored to be here with you this morning as we reflect upon...and remember...our fallen service members and the sacrifices that they and their families have made on behalf of our country.

The "usual" theme of Memorial Day is ... "Remember." Memorial Day is a day of remembering the men and women who died while serving. And today is no different.

We celebrate Memorial Day with parades and picnics, and we welcome in the unofficial beginning of summer...although the heat doesn't seem unofficial to me...this is full on summer.

But...we cannot and we should not forget what this day is really all about. This holiday was started in 1868 to honor over 600,000 soldiers who died in the Civil War. It wasn't until 1971 that it became this national holiday called Memorial Day, designated to remember with pride and to thank those soldiers who gave their lives for the protection of our freedoms.

We all know that this democracy that they lost their lives for, while over 200 years old, continues to evolve and therefore can be...and I say this with no disrespect...a bit messy at times. Any organization that was designed to be "of the people, by the people and for the people," carries with it a tremendous burden to understand just who the people are. From our terrific little village to the major cities, while we all may be members of this great democracy, we are also individuals. It is that individuality and the freedom to express it that makes our form of government so precious and yet so fragile and yes...at times, so messy.

Just like our village, which is undergoing a number of positive changes, there are as many opinions as there are people. **But** it is the right to have those opinions that has sustained us and made us stronger as a community and as a nation. Today we remember those who gave the ultimate sacrifice so that we can continue that way of life.

Many of the young men that my father fought alongside with in World War II did not return home to marry and raise a family. They died on that beach in France or in the snow in Germany. In wars before them and after them many others, young and old, men and women, have died as soldiers fighting other ways for what exactly? They fought for our ability to live freely in a country that tries real hard to live up to the ideals of our founding fathers.

I think that we all have to agree that even though sometimes we do get it wrong...Most of the time we do get it right. Like I said earlier...our democracy can be a little messy.

The brave men and women who have given their time...and far too many of them who have given their lives...to protect our rights...are to be honored today.

Some of our soldiers enlisted for what they thought would be an adventure, some for a strong philosophical commitment to our government, some were drafted, some needed a job, and many others because they felt duty bound.

But what all of the soldiers fought for was our freedom...yours and mine...they fought for people who they didn't know in order to be able to live freely in a country that many of them would never see again. They fought to protect our ability to elect our leaders, practice our religions, or not, to argue conflicting opinions and yes...to criticize their government when we feel it is important to do so.

So...Go home, enjoy your hot dogs and potato salad, look at the pictures and videos of your children and grandchildren in the parade, but make certain to spend at least a bit of time remembering and thanking in your hearts the brave men and women whose sacrifices made all this possible.

Thank you again to the veterans who join us here today. Your sacrifice and those of our fallen soldiers must never be forgotten.

Where once our mission was to serve...Today our mission is **reflection** and **remembrance**.

Your presence here today and that of the people gathering all across America is a tribute to those lost troops and to their Families. **Remember.**

While we are here...let's also take a moment to remember the brave men and women of our Police, Fire, and Rescue departments...our first responders, who gave their lives in the line of duty so that we could be here today.

On behalf of all the families of the Village of Lake Zurich, I wish to thank all the Veterans and their families, all the local Veterans who could not attend today, and all our local sons and daughters presently serving in the military.

I extend our sincerest gratitude and thanks for your sacrifices as you make our country a better place for all of us. I hope you enjoy the weekend, but I hope you pause to reflect and remember.

Freedom is NOT free! America's veterans have earned our lasting gratitude.

Thanks to all of **YOU** for remembering and for letting me be a part of your remembrance today. As the only veteran on the Lake Zurich Village Board, I can tell you that...**I remember**.

One more thing...The **only** time someone should take a knee during our national anthem is to give thanks for the brave men and women who have died for our freedom.

A MEMORIAL DAY PRAYER

As our nation pauses today to remember those in the military who have given their lives for freedoms we enjoy, we pray you would have us all look to you for strength, comfort and guidance. Be with all who serve in our Armed Forces. Bless them and their families. Grant your loving protection. Let peace prevail among all the nations, O God. If it is your will, preserve the lives of the men and women in uniform as they defend our citizenry. EMMAUS HOUSE OF HOSPITALITY IN ITS 18TH YEAR OF MINISTRY

On the weekend of May 19-20, Brian Pozzi, President of the Board of Directors of Emmaus House, offered the following testimony about the ministry and its current need for volunteers.

A little over a year ago, we at Emmaus House had the privilege of providing a mass announcement about our ministry. We are blessed to have the opportunity to do so again.

If you are new to the parish, or simply need a refresher, allow me to provide a brief description of what we do for the least of our brothers and sisters.

Each Sunday night, with a few exceptions, right below us in Father Valker Hall we provide a community dinner and perishable food pantry for those who face difficulties with feeding themselves and their families. The dinners themselves are generously provided by various groups looking for outreach opportunities such as: St. Francis de Sales ministries, parish groups, civic groups, businesses, area churches and school organizations.

We hand out dairy, meat, bread and produce to our guests in the harvest room following dinner. This bounty is designed to help our guests make it through the week more comfortably until our dinner the following week. The food is donated by our generous retail partners in the area, such as Costco, Jewel, Mariano's, Trader Joe's just to name a few. Our volunteers go out to each of these establishments each week to rescue this food that we provide in the harvest room.

In addition to Sunday dinner and food pantry, Emmaus House also sponsors other important programs for our guests including: Jeepers Sneakers, which provides back to school shoes for children, Undie Sunday which distributes new underwear and socks for school age children.

Emmaus does other important work in our community. For example, in the past year, we have provided funding to pay rents, mortgages and utilities for people in danger of losing their homes or apartments. This critical funding provides people with much needed time to get back on their feet financially and to stay in their residencies. These are just a few of the examples of the great things that the Emmaus House does each week.

As always, thank you to all who have volunteered or supported Emmaus House in any way by giving of your time, talents, resources and prayers. We could not do this without everyone's help and we should be proud of this as parishioners in the Lord's work.

Last year, we asked for additional support for our mission and the Lord answered our prayers. We were invigorated by new members of Emmaus House who work at our dinners, or rescue food, or serve on our Board or in some amazing cases, do all of the above. We are so grateful for the extra sets of hands, hearts and minds. It is truly a blessing.

As is often the case, when one door opens, another door closes. As we have welcomed new members to our group, we have also seen members who have served for years move on. We are still in need of new volunteers.

We need leaders who can help us continue to run Emmaus House smoothly. The good news is we have a great program set up by our founders. It's our job to continue what they have put in place. You can help as little as you want or as much as you want. Specifically, we need dinner coordinators – the commitment is one month a year – usually four Sundays to work with the host groups who provide the food and volunteers. This is a great opportunity for one person or two or more friends to do it together. All training and hand holding will be cheerfully provided. Another opportunity is to be Emmaus representative/coordinator for Rock the Block – for a second year Emmaus is the recipient of raffle proceeds that will help us fund our important community projects. Still another opportunity is social media coordinator – we feel that we need to reach out to our community and share the news about our organization. There are many more short or long term projects. The message is simply this. If you feel that you want to lend a hand, we will find a way for you to help as little or as much as you would like and fits your desires.

One of our members provided this quote from Pope Francis: "Keep your gaze on Jesus Christ and learn from Him how to love with a truly human heart, to care for the lost and hurting members of His flock. Learn from Him to give hope and dignity to the destitute, and to go forth to those places where people are in need of acceptance and assistance."

Finally, we cannot say it enough, on behalf of the entire Emmaus House, "Thank you Father Ryan for your support of our ministry." We could not continue to function without your blessing. This past year we became a recipient of the raffle proceeds for Rock the Block. We would not be fortunate enough to have that benefit without the partnership and support of Father Ryan and all of you in the parish.

Thank you again Father Ryan and thank you all for your support and for listening to our request for further help.



While in religion class, students can understand what it truly means to be Catholic. In religion we talk about the history of our church and ow many early followers had to persevere to keep the church going throughout the years. Religion class is also a good time to reflect on what we can do to better ourselves and the people around us. Being reminded every day on how we should treat each other the same way we want to be treated. It's good for every grade level to understand how to treat others with respect and kindness. St. Francis de Sales school not only prepares us spiritually, but also prepares us academically for the next chapter in our life, high school.

Our school is known to be great for high school preparation. Just recently, I shadowed at a Catholic high school. During my stay, the student I was shadowing was taking a test that same day. I took the test and later found out I received the third best score in the class. As the day continued, I felt like I was almost "re-learning" what I have at St. Francis. This truly shows how well St. Francis prepares their students for the next level. Every year I see past students come back whether it's after graduation or on a day off, and personally thank teachers they've had in the past for helping them start on the right track.
