

# PERSISTENCE

Exodus recounts the journey of the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt to the land promised to their ancestors. It was not an easy journey. In today's reading, they are attacked by Amalek and his soldiers, members of one of the peoples who live in the land through which the Israelites are traveling. Moses was on the hilltop with his arms raised to invoke the LORD's assistance in the battle below, a powerful illustration of the LORD's favor upon Israel. If the soldiers were to lift up their eyes to that hill (see Psalm 121:1), they would be reassured by Moses's presence and posture. Paul urges the Thessalonians to persist in proclaiming the gospel, and Jesus likewise commends the widow for her persistence in pursuit of the justice due her. Whether they preach or pray, the followers of Jesus need persistence through periods of difficulty.

# **GOSPEL MEDITATION** ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

Brendan wouldn't stop. He continued nagging his mom to let him have a little more time with his phone. He knew the rules but wanted to finish a game and text a few more friends. He begged, had a temper tantrum, pleaded, screamed, pouted, and used every means he could think of to get Mom to change her mind. Mom had a busy day and was tired. At first, she held her ground. Then, her son's persistence got the best of her, and she caved. "Brendan, you can have 30 more minutes and no more!" she retorted. Brendan's determination paid off. He won.

Is this how it works with God too? If we want something enough and feel it is our due, does our persistence allow us to eventually get our way? Judging God by human standards, it would seem so. But is this the way God works? It gets a bit confusing when Jesus tells his disciples to "pray always without becoming weary" and then further tells them how God will "secure the rights of his chosen ones who call out to him day and night." If we catch God at the right time, when he's having a weak



moment, then our tenacity ought to pay off. What we want, we will get. Really? Sadly, the way many approach prayer suggests that this is precisely how it goes.

Good parents set boundaries and offer proper discipline. They learn the art of being steadfast when presented with determined minds and wills. They know what is best and, at times, have to say "no." God is always there with His full attention and unconditional love showering itself upon us. God also knows what is best. And, as with any

good parent, the one constant that is always available and never withheld is love. We can be as persistent and determined as we want if what we are seeking is God's love. We are never a bother and requests for God's love are never denied. This is the prayer of the heart. Desiring God alone and not only what we want God to do for us places this love relationship foremost in our minds, hearts, and souls. God is never bothered by this prayer. As we breathe in and exhale out, the Divine Life freely flows.


# Who is Ignatius of Antioch and what example does he offer us in Christian living as we celebrate his feast day on October 17th?

As Bishop of Antioch (the modern day city of Antakya, Turkey), Ignatius witnessed to the faith during the reign of Emperor Trajan, who ruled from 98-117. Persecution of Christians broke out in Antioch, and Ignatius was captured and taken to Rome for martyrdom in the arena.

On his journey to Rome over land and sea, Ignatius writes seven letters to various churches. These letters give powerful glimpses into the theology and practice of the early church, along with insights into the role of a bishop as pastoral leader. Ignatius is the first to use the term "Catholic Church" to refer to the various Christian communities of the Roman Empire.

The best known of his letters is the one he wrote to the Romans. Ignatius addresses influential Christians who might be tempted to intercede on his behalf, thus sparing him from martyrdom. He advises them against it, being resolute in his desire to be the "wheat of God." Eucharistic links are most evident in his words. As Christ willingly offered himself as witness to God's total love, Ignatius, too, desired to be "food for the wild beasts," so that he could become "the pure bread of Christ." Eucharistic living was so crucial to Ignatius that he was willing to die in order to model himself on the Lord who willingly offered all.

Reflect on how you can use Ignatius as a model in your own eucharistic life of faith.



# April 26, 2022 Deacon's Corner

 $\boldsymbol{\mathcal{J}}$  wait to get up and write this DC. After serving Masses this past weekend and reading the Gospel (Lk 17: 11-19), I decided this is the subject of today's DC. If you don't recall the Gospel, please go back and read it. It should give you some insight regarding where I am coming from.

The Gospel is the parable of Jesus encountering ten lepers on His journey from Samaria to Galilee. As He entered a village, the ten lepers approached Him. Keeping their distance, they called out saying; "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us". Jesus responded by telling them to go and show yourselves to the priests and while they were on their way, they were all healed of leprosy. Then one of them when he saw he was healed, turned back to fall down at the feet of Jesus and thanked Him. He was the only one to show gratitude to Jesus for curing them. Then Jesus told the one; "get up and go on your way, your faith has made you well".

This leper received from Jesus a double healing. First, he was cured of this horrible illness and second, he has a new relationship with God. And vet, he was the only one of the ten to show his "gratitude" to Jesus. This is what the premise of the DC is all about. I call it the ten percent rule. Only one out of the ten who were cured, came back to say "thank you" to Jesus. And I believe this is so wrong on so many fronts. Think about only saying "thank you" ten percent of the time.

You see, I believe that we must be "thankful" to Jesus for all the blessings He has given us. So many over our entire lives and how often do we take the time to say; "thank you, Jesus". If we don't say it each and every day, we should begin now. And what a result

It is about 4AM on Monday morning and I couldn't you will get by doing so. I know when I am "grateful", I don't have time to complain about anything. How about you? Have you ever stopped and thought about how "grateful" we all should be and how many times we are not? I believe we sometimes feel an element of entitlement in our lives, which can rob us of being "grateful". We should always remember that we are loved without condition. Not because we have earned that love, but because God, our Father, gives us His unconditional love no matter what.

> How often do we ask God to fulfill our needs? And how often do we remember to give "thanks"? I believe to give "thanks" completes the circle of gratitude. So why don't we do it? I will tell you that every night as I say my evening prayers, I never go to sleep without saying; "thank you God for this day". And yes, we all have so much to be "thankful" for such as my life, my faith, my family, my friends, my health, etc., etc. There is so much to be "grateful" for, and we need to remind ourselves of this from time to time. In the great joy of being cured of their sickness, the other nine lepers forgot the greater joy that they were recipients of.

> When we find ourselves in trouble and distress, many of us in desperation turn to prayer, asking for God's help. We ask for an answer to whatever the difficulty that we find ourselves in. We plead for help, crying out as the lepers did from the depth of our being. And Jesus responds to our prayer in a way that is best suited for us. But we can forget, so often, to say "thank you, Jesus". Say a prayer today asking Him to let us never take Him for granted.

Hello, my name is Kelly Smith. I am, and have regularly, my spiritual growth had stagnated. Parish since our beginnings in 2001. I want to tell host an informational meeting on SPRED. However, by the late 90's I was compelled to volunteer as a catechist for a group of developmentally disabled preschoolers. We were using a modified preschool curriculum which was not working out all that well. It was also at this same time, that I was struggling. I felt that something was missing in my life. I was, and am very blessed with a wonderful husband, three children, great friends, and a supportive extended family. So, what could be missing? I realized that although I attended church

been, a SPRED Catechist at St. Francis de Sales Then, I heard that a neighboring parish was to God's call loud and clear. I knew instantly that this was the ministry for me and that it would be a much better fit for our friends with special needs. SPRED is a ministry that happens to serve our special population, but also those that come forward and call themselves their friends. SPRED is a small community of individuals who gather to share God's word and their faith with others. After each SPRED session I am rejuvenated and feel closer to God. My faith has continued to grow, because SPRED feeds the hearts and souls of all involved. That is why, I said yes to SPRED and now twenty years later continue to be passionate about this ministry. 




