

LOVE GOD

As we near the end of the liturgical year we listen to Gospel readings from the final stage of Jesus' ministry—his teaching in Jerusalem. This Sunday Jesus is in conversation with one of the scribes of the temple. In a rare occurrence Jesus and the scribe agree on the two greatest commandments—to love God with all your being and to love your neighbor as yourself.

In today's selection from Deuteronomy Moses gives this teaching to the Israelites as the core of their life of faith and prayer, and Psalm 18 echoes this prayer with the words, "I love you, O LORD, my strength" (Psalm 18:2). Jews and Christians agree that our greatest responsibility is to love the one and only God, and that we cannot claim to love God without loving our neighbor as ourselves.

GOSPEL MEDITATION ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

Centuries of God's devoted people. have found this prayer on their lips: "Hear, O Israel! The Lord is our God. the Lord alone!" The fundamental prayer has been laid as the cornerstone of many spiritual lives. Where did you learn how to pray or did you? Maybe there is a wisdom figure in your life who inspired and guided you by the genuine, holy simplicity of their lives. His or her example may have led you to God and taught you how to pray. Or perhaps you discovered this art on your own after stumbling over yourself enough times and finally realizing it was time to reach out to Someone greater than yourself. There is a timeless truth that we not only tend to forget, but may have never learned. There is only one God, the Lord alone! As a result, we often worship other gods rather than the One true God. Everything in our life gets distorted and we find ourselves lost and off center.

If we haven't learned it yet, there is a life lesson at the top of all of the possible lessons to be learned. There is One True and Eternal God who alone has a solitary claim on us and must be loved with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength. Until we learn this primary lesson, we run the risk of getting distracted and sidetracked. We will also never



really figure out what is at the heart of the relationships we share with the other human beings on this planet with whom we share life. That one primary lesson will teach us the second most valuable lesson: that we must love our neighbor as ourselves. You cannot have one without the other. The presence of God in the core soul of each one of us requires that all of our relationships work together. This truth is at the heart of the Gospel.

If every human being, each in their own way, could stumble upon and genuinely embrace this truth, look how different life would be! Our priorities will immediately

shift from "land me" to 'us and we" and we will develop a more inclusive vision for our brothers and sisters. Concerned not only about my own wellbeing and happiness. but also that of our brothers and sisters, humanity stands a chance at succeeding in the struggle with injustice, abuse, inequity, violence, war, entitlement, and privilege. It seems that getting to this point has been at the heart of the Gospel and the kingdom of God from the moment Jesus first started to preach. It's a wonder why, then, why so many centuries later, we have still failed to achieve his vision. Maybe we just haven't learned our primary lessons yet.

THE DAILY EXAMEN OF STEWARDSHIP

"Stewardship" can get a bum rap these days. When folks hear the term "stewardship" from the pulpit, their eyes tend to kind of glaze over. "Here's Father asking for more money," they groan inwardly, "Get ready for the passing of the pledge cards."

Christ refutes this idea when he gives us what he calls the greatest commandments — instructing us to love God and to love our neighbor. Now, Christ is a man who chose his words carefully. He meant exactly what he said — and he didn't say that the greatest commandments were to tithe and to give money to charity. If he had wanted stewardship to be only about money, he would have said so.

Sometimes we are indeed called to show our love for God and neighbor in the form of a financial gift. But the concept of Everyday Stewardship — living mindfully in prayer, grateful for our blessings, and gracious to our neighbors, committed to God, and accountable to each other — is about so much more.

I propose a twist on the long-held practice of the "Daily Examen" — a pious devotion wherein, at day's end, we go over the events of the last 24 hours and discern God's will. A Daily Examen of Stewardship might contain questions like this:

How did Hove God today? In whom did Hove Him?

What did God give me today? With whom did I share it? What did I give to Him?

To whom did I reach out today? Who reached out to me?

Where was God on my list of priorities today? First? Second? Third, fourth?

Pilgrimages are really a symbol of our spiritual journey in life, reminding us that this world is not our true home and that we spend our lives journeying to our homeland, which is the Kingdom of God.



way, by visiting a holy place. At times, such as on a special feast, a jubilee, or the anniversary of the dedication of the church, special graces (called "indulgences") can also be offered to pilgrims, helping to enrich our experience of the celebration.

In the end, pligrimages are an ancient act of devotion and something that each of us can put into practice, helping us to discover how God is present in the world around us, in places both near and far.

Many blood drives have had to canceled, which has led to a dramatic drop in blood donations in recent weeks. Who benefits from blood donation?

At Versiti Blood Center of Illinois, formerly Heartland Blood Centers, we never forget the patients who receive the blood we collect. Every unit (pint) is collected, transported, tested and stored according to tightlycontrolled procedures.

Examples of transfusion needs are:

- Cancer: up to 8 units/month
- Bone Marrow Transplant: up to 2 units/day
- Liver Transplant: up to 100 units
- Auto Accident: up to 50 units
- Cardiovascular Surgery: 2-25 unit


A Holiday Tradition | A Gift of Love



Deacon's Corner

In hile serving Mass this past Saturday, the 24th, The other side of this Gospel is the members of the Gospel of Mk 10: 46-52. I have always liked this towards Bartimaeus. First they tell him to "shut Gospel about Bartimaeus, the son of Timaeus, who shouts to Jesus as He is walking by; "Jesus, Son of tone saying; "take heart, get up". Do you think David, have mercy on me". These verses struck me because of the different reactions that Jesus' disciples had before and after Jesus heard the plea from Bartimaeus. It is for those reasons I thought it would be a good topic for a DC. If you are not familiar with the chapter and verse, I suggest you grab your Bible and give it a read to better understand what I am going to write about.

Let's begin this DC with a thought from Frank Sinatra. When I gave this homily, Bobbi mentioned afterwards that some of the congregates might not know what I was talking about since Frank Sinatra was well before their time. But I felt I got enough head shakes to affirm my idea of Frank's sona; "I did it my way". This song remains one of his greatest hits, not only because of how well he sang it, but because of its meaning. We would all like to "do it our way". To have everything go according to our own plans like a self-made person in charge of his or her own destiny. And we tend to believe that is possible because we believe two things that are not true. The first is "what we do, we do" rather than it being done through God's grace and generosity. The second is that we believe that "selfreliance is freedom". You might ask; "Deacon John, what do you mean by that?" Well perhaps you have ventured out on a career and found success without the assistance of others. But underlying these gains are the truths that God's love is what sustains us and allows us to achieve great things, and that true freedom comes through communal life in Christ. And that is what we all have in our Church as we are a community of disciples known as the Church of Christ.


I also preached the homily after proclaiming the crowd who behave in a hypocritical manner up", but when Jesus calls him, they change their any of these people feel remorse for their sheep like behavior? I asked myself the question; "where would I fit in this story?" Would I be happy to fall in with the crowd with its different moods and reactions? Or can I see myself showing the courage and persistence of Bartimaeus?

> This lovely healing story reminds us of the earlier passages about being persistent (the widow, the friend looking for help). Bartimaeus persists and is healed. And when he receives his sight, he becomes a follower of Jesus, which makes him a model of discipleship. Can you relate this story to some part of your life that you heard Jesus say to you; "what do you want Me to do for you?"

> If Jesus asked you the question that He asked the blind man, what would be your answer? The best part of being asked that question by Jesus is that we realize that what we want is important to Jesus. And knowing this should help us enter into a meaningful conversation with Him knowing that I matter to Him.

> It can be hard, especially in today's society, to stand up and be counted. We are conditioned not to make spectacles of ourselves. But unless we stand up for truth and justice, we fail others and condemn ourselves to a life of mediocrity. Jesus chose not to go down the road of mediocrity and He gives us the ability, the tools to follow Him both now and forever.


