



THE MESSIAH FORETOLD

Today's story of the cure of a deaf man with a speech impediment is a good example of how much is contained in a simple miracle story. The Greek word mogilalos appears only here in all of the New Testament. It is a technical term referring to someone with a stammer. It is also used only once in the entire Jewish scriptures, in the passage that we read today as our first reading from Isaiah. Clearly, by his choice of this precise word Mark wants us to recognize that what Jesus is doing is the fulfillment of what Isaiah had predicted centuries earlier. In fact, Mark wants us to recognize that Jesus is the Messiah foretold by Isaiah and the other Jewish prophets of old.

The word ephphatha, "be opened," used to describe the restoration of the man's speech, is another example of a subtle allusion to an earlier prophecy. This time the prophecy in question is from Ezekiel, when he foretells that in the messianic age, "your mouth shall be opened to speak" (24:26). The sophistication of Mark's narrative is further revealed when we realize that there are multiple levels within a single reference. Mark not only draws our attention back to Israel's prophetic past, he also points to the initiatory practice of his contemporaries by his mention of such things as spittle, , and the use of the word ephphatha, all of which were practices incorporated into the early Church's baptismal ritual. copyright (c) J. GOSPEL MEDITATION

ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

From the time we are born into this world until we die, our human radar picks up signals about how to respond to life. What we picked up on when we were very young carries an even greater power. The messages we receive and process tell us what we are "supposed" to do with our feelings, how to understand and cope with disappointment, anxiety, failure, death, illness, and what to expect out of life. As life unfolds for us, these radar messages kick in and resonate in us at very deep levels. Sometimes what we have learned is helpful and sometimes it is not. The stories we have been told, especially when we are young, about how life is best lived and how to negotiate its pain carry a heavy weight.

Life can be challenging and frightening. Sometimes, it really hurts to be a human being. It also can be quite unpredictable and, at times, unfair. We face our vulnerability and brokenness of all kinds: physical, emotional, and spiritual. It doesn't take much for life to quickly fall apart. What we knew to be familiar and true is gone and something we relied upon, physically, emotionally, or spiritually, can be taken away. It is hard to confront our limitations and sit with our incompleteness.



Often, life hurts us so much that we find ourselves sitting in a pool of sadness, not sure what we are supposed to do. It is particularly hard when the signals we have inherited tell us that we need to be successful in what we do, and we have to avoid life's unfairness. We can feel like a failure, wondering what precisely we did to deserve this fate, or ruminate about what we did not do correctly. But it's really not about us. We are part of a bigger picture and a much more fascinating story!

If we cease doing battle with life's incompleteness and see ourselves, as God does, on a journey toward wholeness and completeness

we can better accept our disappointments and stand firm. The prophets told us, and Jesus reassured us: Be strong! Fear not! Sometimes we have to update our stories and replace them with newer, more accurate ones. When we make God's story our own and tune our radar into His voice, what we hear is all about restoration, healing, and rejuvenation! This is true even when we think we have hit rock bottom and can go no further. There is always hope. Remember the words of Julian of Norwich: God made us, God loves us, and God keeps us. Now, listen to God when He says, "be opened!" Be healed and allow your stories to change.

And people brought to him a deaf man who had a speech impediment and begged him to lay his hand on him. He took him off by himself away from the crowd. He put his finger into the man's ears and, spitting, touched his tongue; then he looked up to heaven and groaned, and said to him, "Ephphatha!"—that is, "Be opened!"

CHOOSING DEAFNESS

If you're a parent, you know that hearing evaluations are usually done at a child's annual physical exam starting around age four. The little person gets hoisted up onto the exam table, fitted with a pair of special headphones, and then they need raise their hand when they hear a sound.

I bet all of us parents who have sat through one of these tests with a preschooler — especially a particularly strong-willed one — have experienced a moment where we ask ourselves: I wonder if there's something wrong with her hearing. Is that why she doesn't listen to me? 'Come here, put on your shoes, pick up your toys, finish your carrots, don't touch that' — she isn't being naughty, she just can't hear it!

And then that moment, for those of us whose kids passed the hearing test with flying colors, comes crashing down into a realization that, yep, they can hear just find. They're just choosing deafness.

But how can we really get mad when we remember that we do the same thing to God day in and day out? I often wonder if God, sitting in His Heaven, tires of calling to us in the same way young parents tire of calling out unheeded directions to their small children. Help that person. Hear My voice. Open your heart. Give of yourself here. Talk to Me.

What is the call He wishes you to hear today? Can you hear it? Are you listening?

AS WE CELEBRATE LABOR DAY, CAN YOU TELL ME ABOUT CATHOLIC TEACHING REGARDING LABOR?

One of the most important principles of Catholic social teaching is the dignity of work and the rights of workers. Four encyclicals address this foundational social teaching: Rerum Novarum (1891) by Leo XIII, Quadragesimo Anno (1931) by Pius XI, Laborem Exercens (1981), and Centesimus Annus (1991) by John Paul II. They address both the theology and dignity of work. In Genesis, God takes the initiative in creating the world, calling forth human beings to be faithful stewards of creation. We are thus formed to share in God's continuing creative activity by partnering with God in finishing the world and helping bring it to completion and fulfillment. From this perspective, work can be spiritually understood in terms of sharing in God's ongoing activity to build, create, and transform the world. Human beings are co-creators with God. This vocation demands self-discipline.

Besides an exercise in self-discipline, work is also the means by which we develop and fulfill ourselves. In work, we shape the world and our environment. Through work, we also shape ourselves. Pope John Paul II summarized this point in *Laborem Exercens* #6, "the value of work is not primarily the kind of work being done, but the fact that the one who is doing it is a person."

Labor Day offers an excellent opportunity to reflect on how we view work in light of our Catholic social teaching.





STATEMENT OF CARDINAL BLASE CUPICH ON TRADITIONIS CUSTODES

I am grateful to Pope Francis for issuing on July 16, 2021, an apostolic letter entitled *Traditionis Custodes* ("Guardians of the Tradition"). His letter gives directions about the use of the liturgical forms prior to the reforms of 1970, that is, the use of the Roman Missal published under the auspices of Pope St. John XXIII in 1962. In doing so, Pope Francis follows a trajectory from Pope St. John Paul II through Pope Benedict XVI and into his own pontificate with regard to the use of this earlier Missal. His concern is the unity of the Church. Very properly, by entrusting the implementation of his directives to local diocesan bishops, he restores the principle that the bishop is the chief liturgist in the diocese.

In response to the letter I will take time to study, reflect and consult with others on it and in due time offer a pathway for implementing what the Holy Father has asked us to do, keeping in mind the principle of unity and the ability to appropriately authorize the use of the Missal of 1962. In the meanwhile, current practices with regard to the 1962 Missal remain in place.

My hope and prayer, as always and in communion with the Holy Father, is for the unity of the Church. I also pray that this will be an occasion for all of us to deepen our understanding and appreciation of the worship life of the Church, the Eucharist and the liturgical renewal of the Second Vatican Council which, St. Pope John Paul affirmed, represents the "movement of the Holy Spirit in the Church." Dear Brothers,

During my vicariate meetings with the priests, I was told that some parishioners are asking their pastors to provide or sign a document testifying that their refusal to be vaccinated against the Covid virus is supported by the teaching of the Catholic Church. I do know that some bishops individually or by state have provided templates for such a declaration, even though there is no basis in Catholic moral teaching for rejecting vaccine mandates on religious grounds.

In fact, the Holy See has clearly stated that receiving the Covid vaccine is unquestionably in keeping with Catholic faith, and even has urged people to be vaccinated as an act of charity and out of respect for the common good in fighting the pandemic. Our moral teaching, while ever respectful of the rights of individuals, always keeps in focus the common good. Not doing so distorts Catholic doctrine.

Therefore, if you are asked to offer such testimony, please politely decline and explain that doing so would mean that you would be endorsing something that is not in keeping with Catholic teaching. Parishioners surely can determine their own actions, but it would be important to clarify that they cannot use the teaching of the church to justify such decisions, which in their essence, are a rejection of the church's authentic moral teaching regarding Covid vaccines.

This letter gives me the opportunity once again to thank you for your extraordinary service to God's People and assure you of my closeness to you in this time of the pandemic, filled with great challenges but also God's abundant grace.

Deacon's Corner

Jesterday while serving Mass and listening to Fr. Paul's homily, it struck me that I have not been thankful enough to Our Lord for all that has taken place in my life, especially in the past eighteen months. While the consequences of that time in my life might be looked at as a challenge or not so good by some, as I look back, it is imperative that I look at the good things, the good results of what has taken place.

How about you? Can you look back just eighteen months and say "Thank God" for all that has taken place. And while you might say that you also experienced some challenges, disappointments and/or heartache, I have decided that I must always focus on the positive, the good that has taken place in my life, even as a result of the difficult times that I experienced.

So let's travel back in time for a moment some 2,000 years ago, when Jesus walked among us. I believe that Jesus Christ has suffered the most challenges, disappointments and heartache each and every day of His short, three year, ministry. We must remember that Jesus knew all that was to happen to him well in advance of it happening, but yet, He continued on His journey up to and including His Death and Resurrection. And He did it out of His love for us. He never complained and He could have decided not to proceed with His life on earth, but He didn't. His love for us exceeded all that was put before Him. And I believe it is our responsibility as Christians to say "Thank You". But I also believe that we have a duty to Jesus to "do better today than we did yesterday, but not as good as we will do tomorrow".

So what does that really mean? To me, it means that we cannot and should not take Our Lord and Savior,

Jesus Christ, for granted. Yes, we know He is always available to help us in our time of need. To get us through the challenges, disappointments and/or heartache that we so often encounter in our own daily lives. And what does He ask in return? Just that we love Him as much as He loves us. While you might say; "Deacon John, that is not possible". I say you are correct, but that should not hinder us from trying.

Look back in each of your lives over the past eighteen months. I know for me, the past eighteen months have seen a torn achilles tendon and having to wait five months for surgery to repair it due to COVID, six months of physical therapy afterward, then contracting COVID pneumonia and ending up in intensive care. Then, in the past few months, suffering three minor strokes and now being in cardio-therapy. And yet, after all that, I can wake up in the morning and look in the mirror and see that I am still here. AND I THANK GOD.

There are times when we suffer through challenges with good friends, family members, workmates, etc. and we feel the pain they are suffering. It is those times in my life that I turn to Jesus Christ through prayer and my faith helps me know that "goodness and truth shall prevail".


