

Building on the Cornerstone

Before I married my husband, I assumed there were "ugly houses" and "pretty houses," and that was that. But Matt is an architect, someone who reads books with titles like "A Field Guide to American Houses" for fun and who uses the term *vernacular architecture* like he knows what it means.

Through him, I've come to learn a lot about why certain structures simply don't have a pleasing look. There is a logic to ugliness, as it turns out. One of the main reasons a building or a home might strike some of us as ugly is because it has undergone a careless renovation. Whether out of laziness or an effort to be cost-effective, additions are made that depart from the architectural style of the original structure. The result is slapdash, confusing — ugly, for lack of a better word.

What is added on later must somewhat resemble the original. If you want to depart dramatically from the original style of a building, it's better to build a separate structure altogether.

I think of this principle when I consider Christ as the "cornerstone." We know we are called to model ourselves on Christ, to build on his example. But so often we cherry-pick elements of his message and attempt to build on it with additions that make no sense.

When someone looks at us, at our lives, they should be able to tell after whom that life is patterned. We must resemble the cornerstone, if we do not, it will be apparent, unseemly. You can't see God the Father without embracing God the Son. You can't chart the future of a house without any thought for its past.

If Christ is not our inspiration, he will be our contradiction.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Are Catholics obligated to attend Mass each Sunday, or receive Communion each Sunday?

Answer:

The questions about Mass attendance and the reception of Holy Communion are clearly outlined in what are traditionally called the "Precepts" of the Church. These specific teachings are intended to stand alongside the Ten Commandments as fundamental practices for Catholics and are outlined in the Code of Canon Law. The obligations related to Mass attendance and receiving Communion are outlined in the first and third precepts, which we find quoted in the Catechism of the Catholic Church (no. 2042):

The first precept ("You shall attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation and rest from servile labor") requires the faithful to sanctify the day commemorating the Resurrection of the Lord as well as the principal liturgical feasts honoring the mysteries of the Lord, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and the saints; in the first place, by participating in the Eucharistic celebration, in which the Christian community is gathered, and by resting from those works and activities which could impede such a sanctification of these days.

The third precept ("You shall receive the sacrament of the Eucharist at least during the Easter season") guarantees as a minimum the reception of the Lord's Body and Blood in connection with the Paschal feasts, the origin and center of the Christian liturgy.

Rather than seeing these as obligations that are simply to be fulfilled out of a sense of duty, Pope Saint John Paul II reminds us of the grace that is made available to us when we gather for Sunday celebrations of the Eucharist: "Sunday is the day which is at the very heart of the Christian life... Time given to Christ is never time lost, but is rather time gained, so that our relationships and indeed our whole life may become more profoundly human" (Dies Domini, no. 7).



THEOLOGY 101

How to listen to a homily whether good or not so good

No one will argue that all homilies are of the same quality. They certainly are not. Sometimes, when the priest or deacon speaks from conviction and with passion, we can easily be caught up in the word of God that he seeks to proclaim and explain. We begin to see connections between the word and our daily lives with all their challenges. Other times, probably more frequently, the homily is OK but not very inspired or inspiring. Finally, there are those homilies that can only be characterized as cringe-worthy - perhaps cluttered with a string of bad jokes or a collection of pious but pointless tidbits. Maybe the homily seems to bore even the preacher himself.

So, where does that put ordinary people in the congregation? Is it just a matter of the luck of the draw? Or is it a matter of listening attentively and gratefully when it is good and just resigning ourselves to those times when it is not so good?

A good starting point to answer these questions is to note the importance of the word of God that the homilies should break open and unfold for us. Our contact with the word of God contained in the Scriptures is vitally important to us. God's word gives us enlightenment as we face the challenging enigmas of life. That same word offers hope in the middle of the inevitable and deep struggles that come our way.

The homily ought to lead us into that all-important word to understand it and then lead us out of the word to live it in our lives. Sometimes, that does happen. Often, it does not. But there is an art to listening that can help us even when the homily or the homilist falters. There are things we can and ought to do as a matter of course.

Before we go to church, perhaps a day or more before we go, we should read the readings. Access to the online readings is easy. Go to this

website: www.bible.usccb.org. As you read, do so not as if you were reading a newspaper for information, but rather look on the readings as a way that God is personally communicating with you. Ask yourself, "What is the Lord trying to

tell me?" Spend some time. Don't try to figure things out. Rather, listen attentively as you would to someone who loves you and wants to communicate with you, because that is exactly what God is doing through the biblical word. If you do this, when you arrive in church, you will be more than a passive consumer: You will be

attentive to the word proclaimed and explained.

As the homilist preaches whether superbly or not so well something ought to emerge for you in the preaching. For that to happen, you need to be an active listener. You need to move from passive to active listening to hear something meaningful in the message. You need to be primed for this experience



by your own reflection and prayer

After Mass and through the week, the process should continue. You leave the church with your experience of word and sacrament. Stay with the word. Medieval spiritual writers

spoke of ruminatio, which literally means "chewing" on the word. Let its power to inspire, to challenge, to console and to engender hope take hold of you across the week.

In the end, we can say that the proclamation of the word and preaching are essential elements of spiritual sustenance. Certainly, responsibility lies with those who

proclaim and preach. That is why we must pray for them. Responsibility, however, also rests with all of those who listen. We not only receive the word given to us, we must also take hold of it.






