

### HISTORY OF SALVATION

The first reading today continues the "history of salvation" narrative that we hear throughout Lent this year. Today's story was among the best-loved in the Jewish tradition (surely Joseph told the story to young Jesus as he formed him in the ways of their faith); the early fathers of the Church were very fond of it as a means of explaining the sacrifice of Christ on the cross. The overall tone of the first reading, psalm, and second reading seems a little incongruous with the dazzling Gospel, until we remember that the Transfiguration was placed as the Gospel for this Sunday precisely to remind us of the glory that awaits those who live faithfully and obediently to the will of God. In the life of Jesus, it is a preview of the glory of his resurrection; for us it is a glimpse of the destiny of those who continue, as we heard in last week's Gospel, to repent and believe in the Good News. copyright (c) J. ### GOSPEL MEDITATION

### **ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE**

A pregnant woman was walking. in the store and met an old friend. Her friend exclaimed. "You are absolutely beaming!" The new life God placed in her womb radiated throughout her body. It was brightly visible on her face and in her eyes. Transformation and change usually happen from the inside out. It is very rare that simply imposing structure from the outside does any good. Yes, it is true that routines and habits can change when things are done. differently. But, for this change to last there has to be an interior. renewal and metamorphosis as well. Simply regulating behavior and bringing someone into conformity with accepted protocols doesn't mean their heart and soulcome with them.

Peter was a homeless man who lived in a very remote and rudimentary tent community. He was happy to make his daily trip to McDonald's and always welcomed a gift card or two so that he could buy some coffee and something to eat. A generous advocate worked to secure him an apartment in hopes of moving Peter out of his makeshift housing and into something safer. Peter finally got the grand tour of his new "digs," received his own key, remarked how wonderful the place



was, closed the door behind him when they left and never returned. He preferred his tent. No matter how much things changed on the outside, Peter was happy where he was. A poignant lesson was learned that day.

How is your Lent going? By now you ought to have a sense of whether you're really "into it" this year and something transformational is happening. For many, it's only the stuff on the outside that changes for a few weeks and then they return to business as usual. For others, there are some real inner changes happening that are deepening

their relationships with God, others, self, and creation. If we are serious about moving to a new place and radiating with the presence of new life and joy, then we have to clear the way to listen for God's call. Then, there is God's request to change things up a bit and order our lives differently. After realizing we have been called and given a mission, we have to trust that this is where we need to be. And then, after all of this hard work we are asked to act. The fruit that is revealed will indicate whether our journey is authentic. The brilliance of conversion will begin to shine on our faces as we contemplate the One to whom we are asked to listen.

# WHEN SACRIFICE BECOMES MUNDANE

It seems to happen every year, like clockwork: we drag a bit, as we enter into the second week of Lent. On Ash Wednesday, we feel a bit like soldiers banging our shields, rushing into battle. "We're ready, God!" our hearts cry out. "Transform us through sacrifice! Your will be done!"

But by now, these Lenten resolutions are no longer novelties — they've joined the ranks of everyday inconveniences, which somehow are the hardest to bear. Because transformation, in real life, happens in inches, just as a battle is won slowly in the crash of one sword against another. It's not always a dramatic thing, to the naked eye. It's the perseverance in prayer despite weariness, or the continual denial of some pleasure even though there's that

nagging voice in our minds saying; go ahead, God doesn't really mind.

It's a week when we all need a shock to the system — and wouldn't you know it, this Sunday God gives us a double-whammy of dramatic sacrificial scenes. We picture Abraham, who also cried "Ready!" when God called, never imagining what He would ask: the surrender of his long-awaited son. We see Christ himself transfigured, as God shows us what He is ready to give up for love of us.

We must remain committed, persevering daily in acknowledging that everything belongs to God. What we sacrifice, we simply give back to Him.

If God is for us, who can be against us? Can we still reply, "Ready!" when we hear the call of God?

# WHY DO WE USE INCENSE AT MASS?

The use of incense in religious ceremonies and worship is a practice that predates Christianity, and which is also found in many other religious traditions today.

Incense, which is made from resin infused with aromatic spices and oils, is one of those fundamentally human symbols that incorporates more than one of our senses, helping us to reflect on realities that transcend the everyday details of our lives.

The use of incense in the Church's liturgy — in the Mass, as well as in devotions to the Eucharlst and the Liturgy of the Hours — is

inspired by the use of incense in the Jewish tradition. In the writings of the Old Testament, we hear about incense being used in the worship of the temple, and Psalm 141 asks, "Let my prayer be incense before you; my uplifted hands an evening offering" (vs. 2). The image here is that, as the incense gently rises to heaven, our prayers also rise to God as something sweet and pleasant.



Another ancient use of incense that has also become part of our Catholic tradition. is the idea that when we incense something, it's because it is something. special or sacred. This is why the Book of the Gospel is incensed during the Liturgy of the Word and the bread, wine, priest celebrant, and congregation are incensed at the presentation of the gifts. To this, we can also add the incensing of the Blessed Sacrament during eucharistic

adoration and benediction, and the body of the deceased at the end of the Mass of the Resurrection (the Funeral Mass).



## Virtual Fair Showcases Student Scientists



# Deacon's Corner

ith this past Sunday being the Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time, we know that Lent will soon be here. A recent gospel spoke about the beginning of the journey of Jesus. And in a homily I gave, I likened it to the inauguration. Webster defines inauguration as; "a formal beginning or introduction". You see, Jesus began His preaching to the multitudes and healing of the sick at this time. He also began to "choose His cabinet", for as He walked along the Sea of Galilee, He chose Simon, Andrew, James and John to join Him on His journey. They all agreed and came with Jesus immediately. Jesus' inaugural address was simple and to the point. He said; "Repent the Kingdom of Heaven is near".

I thought about this for a while. I am not sure how I would react if a stranger came to where I was working and said; "Come follow Me". How about you? What do you think your reaction would be to such a shocking command? But in giving this more thought, Jesus has said this exact same thing to all of us. And He did so since we were born and baptized into believing and professing the Word of God. Jesus knew that it was time to begin preaching the Good News of the Kingdom. He knew it was time to cure every disease and sickness among the people.

Some might ask; "why did Jesus cure so many, especially those with very serious afflictions?" Let's not forget that the culture of that time felt that if you had an affliction such as leprosy, paralysis, blindness, etc. that you were being punished for being a sinner. Or that someone in your family had sinned and their affliction was passed on to you as generational. That is why I believe that Jesus chose to cure so many. He knew that He had to make a dramatic statement about who He is and why He is here on earth.

The question I pose to all today is; "has Jesus gotten your attention?" 2,000 years later, do we have enough FAITH to "follow Him"? I believe that is sometimes a difficult question for us to answer. I know for me it has been over the course of my life. After all, if we truly "followed Him"

all the time, every minute of every day, 24/7, we would have to live in a sin-free world. And I know, at least for me, I have "fallen off the wagon of faith" at one time or another. How about you?

The greatest thing about Jesus' walk on this earth is that He came here to be ridiculed, spat upon, crowned with thorns, scourged at the pillar and ultimately crucified to die only to rise from the dead so that every time we "fall off the wagon", our sins will be forgiven through reconciliation.

So today, let's pick up our own Cross and follow Jesus more closely. Let's use the ASK method. You ask; "Deacon John, what is the ASK method?" Well you may remember some weeks ago, I preached about JOY and how we should use the J for Jesus, O for others, and the Y for yourself. And many still talk to me about that weeks later. So now let's think about the ASK method. A means "ask and you shall receive", S means "seek and you will find", and K means "knock and it will be opened for you". The ASK method is more fully explained in Matthew 7: 7-8.

In summary today, I want everyone to think about the upcoming Season of Lent. And I suggest that we do not think about "giving something up" for 40 days. I can remember growing up and giving up Coke and/ or chocolate was a big thing to "give up" during Lent. And I guess it was a good thing to do at the time but after the 40 days of Lent were over, we went back to our same old routine. So in recent years, I have developed a new idea for Lent. That is to do something different, make a change in our lives, perhaps, to the betterment of someone else. Give to the poor, help a neighbor, even smile at a stranger. It doesn't have to be something of epic proportion, but I suggest you do it forever, not just for 40 days. I have done this for many years during Lent and I promise you when Lent is over and you continue this practice, you will feel better forever.
