

Parish Pastoral Council Meeting

Minutes of December 3, 2019 Meeting Ministry Center - Fr. Joseph Firnbach Meeting Room

Present: Fr. David F. Fr. Ryan had to leave the meeting for an emergency so he asked Chair of the Parish Pastoral Council Tom Purtell to preside at the meeting. Chair Purtell began the meeting at 6 pm with the Renew My Church prayer.

1. FIX IT CAMPAIGN - Doug Samz, Finance Council Chair

- a. Operational Update PPC postponed an update from Deacon John Sfire and Jason Sfire because they were not able to attend the meeting, due to an emergency.
- b. Financial Update Doug Samz

Doug Samz indicated that the parish is in good shape for total contributions although the target of \$1.7 million has yet to be achieved. Approximately \$1,482,000 has been collected as of this date with \$13,000 outstanding. Doug Samz and Pam Lynch are not concerned about collectability. Pam Lynch indicated that a new mailing went out to prospective new donors that have not donated in the past. Another 20 or so donors pledged and paid. Doug Samz reconciles contributions with Pam Lynch on a quarterly basis. Through September 30, 2019, there was \$130,000 available in the bank. It was discussed what projects are remaining to complete, which is the flooring in the church and the area around the Altar. Christina Sikorski, PTO Chair, brought up the suggestion of adding railings on either side of the altar.

2. PARISH SCHOOL UPDATE - Kyle Schmitt, Principal

Kyle Schmitt distributed a sheet showing Enrollment Projections which is Attachment A. The points highlighted were as follows:

- a. Based on previous trends from previous years, the Preschool program is expected to be at full capacity again for the 2020-2021 school year with at least three classrooms and possibly a fourth class depending on interest shown in the summer of 2020.
- b. Two grades have a projected net re-enrollment rate of less than 100% which are the 4 year old preschool class and the fifth grade class.
 - The 4 yr. old preschool class includes PreK, and the net re-enrollment rate is projected to be about 54%. The reason for this is many parents send their child(ren) to SFDS because it is a great value for preschool in the area with high quality staff, but then they send their children to the free public schools for K-8 so enrollment drops off.
 - From fifth to sixth grade, the school loses approximately 10% of students that transition to the public junior high again for cost saving reasons.
- c. Kyle Schmitt then reviewed the other school updates noted on his handout.
 - The theme for the 2019-2020 is the "Best Year Ever". Christy Sikorski said they are trying to engage parents more and be more inclusive and collaborative.
 - Kyle Schmitt discussed the school initiatives for the current school year were set last March and are the following:
 - 1. Focusing on improving the K-8 writing and MS Math curriculums
 - STREAMS development Stands for "Science, Technology, English, Arts, Math, and Social Studies. They already had the kick-off for expanding these programs.
 - The School Board Workstreams are ideas that came out of the Bright Minds Survey and feedback has been or is still being obtained. Kyle highlighted the following areas:
 - a. Communication The new website is being redesigned.
 - Marketing and Enrollment -There is new branding being implemented (i.e. new logo on uniforms)
 - c. Fundraising This is an ongoing project.

3. ALPHA AND OTHER UPDATES by Pam Lynch - Director of Adult and Youth Ministry, Evangelization

- a. Pam Lynch spoke about the Reconciliation, Reflection & Adoration on December 19th. Tom Purtell will look into bringing the monstrous dedicated to St. John Paul II to the Adoration. Josh Goodman, Music Coordinator, will play the guitar, and there will be plano music as well. This 12 hour time of grace is part of the effort of evangelizing to encourage people to return to Jesus, to turn to Jesus, and continue to seek Jesus.
- b. Next, Pam Lynch gave an update on ALPHA, which is now in week 9. Approximately 125 people attend each week which includes the leaders. There is an average of approximately 105 guests with the Tuesday evening and Thursday morning sessions. During the summer pilot, there were approximately 70 guests each week. At the Day Away retreat at Loyola in Woodstock 65 people attended out of 125 registered.
 - Mary Taylor and Lorraine Holland are outstanding in coordinating Alpha, and the parish is thankful for their leadership.
 - ii. Regarding recruiting leaders, the goal is to inspire them through BUILD, EQUIP, AND ALPHA beginning as a guest, then a host, and then a leader. The goal is to have people stay and move through each of the three phases.
 - III. BUILD will start in January 2020, but the exact date is to be determined.
 - iv. There will be a Christmas video, and the plan is to show before or during the Masses. Our parish wants to grow in faith and wants individuals to come and ask questions. Beginning will be seasonal (Christmas and then each holiday/holy day throughout the year), and promoting the spiritual opportunities in the future to seek Jesus. The same person that Kyle Schmitt uses for graphics, Jonathan Moreno, will be used for this video.
 - V. RCIA Deacon Bob Arvidson has four people as of the current date.
 - vi. There might be a Lenten Bible Study, and Ray Urban and Toni Flaherty will be coordinating.
 - vii. Tom Purtell asked Pam Lynch to comment on the roadmap for evangelization and discipleship. Following is her summary:
 - 1. ALPHA is for those amongst us or those we are aware of who have not been in church, walked away, and/or is seeking a relationship with or to deepen their relationship with Jesus as Savior. It is meant to bring people into the Body of Christ and consists of 10 basic sessions. Guests can ask questions in a non judgmental environment, as St. James reminds us, and they will have the opportunity to say what they believe. Teaching happens through the videos. After the video, it is opened for discussion. Many people find small group discussion the best part.
 - BUILD focuses on "Why does church teach this?" "What does it mean?" It is meant to help people mature one's faith.
 - EQUIP This program is to help people be EQUIPPED to go out and evangelize a draw people to Jesus. EQUIP is not running this year.

A new generation of disciples: Making a healing difference

AS I GET OLDER (I'm already in my eighth decade), I hear my contemporaries writing off whole generations. They might say, "Oh, those millennials, when are they going to really learn how to work?" And, "The kids in school today are like fragile orchids with all their sensitivities and trigger points."

Well, I think so many of my contemporaries are very much mistaken. Large numbers of young people today are people of substance who embrace ideals and are willing to do something to make them real. Recently, we saw young people throughout the world call for action to address climate change: to address a sad situation that earlier generations have bequeathed to them. We have also witnessed young people taking a stand on gun violence, as they try to make a difference and create a safer world. We also know how young people have stood up to bullying and have tried to create an environment of mutual respect among all people.

If we step back from these and similar initiatives that young people are taking, there seems to be a common thread. In different ways, they are trying to bring healing. They want healing for a damaged environment, for a culture of violence and for vulnerable people hurt by others.

A matter of faith and discipleship

The young people who are working hard for healing in the world are following a Gospel instinct, although they may not be explicitly aware of it. Jesus is a healer of humanity and the world. He wants his disciples to share in that healing mission. If we could help young people to connect the dots between their desire to foster healing and their following of Jesus, great things can happen. This connection could also alleviate some of our anxieties about their future connections with faith and the Church.

An older Catholic generation worries about their children and grandchildren. Will they have faith? Will they be Catholic? That

worry is well-founded, because sociological studies indicate many young Catholics drift away from the Church. It is not a matter of deliberate rejection or, even less, of overt hostility. It is largely a matter of just drifting away. Of course, the scandals surrounding abuse in the Church have not helped matters. Even so - I strongly believe - if young

people saw that their idealism and sense of purpose in bringing healing to the world are linked to following Jesus in his community of faith, which would go far in anchoring them in the resources of faith and Church. It really is a matter of linking faith in all its richness with the urgent experience that young people have as they face a broken world.

missionaries wherever we are and in whatever company we find ourselves: in our neighborhoods, in school or sports or social life, in volunteer service or in the workplace. Wherever we are, we always have an opportunity to share the joy of the Gospel. This is how the Lord goes out to meet everyone. He loves you, dear young people, for you are the means by which he can spread his light and hope. He is counting on your courage, your boldness and your enthusiasm." (Christus vivit, 177)

Pope Francis 'gets it'

In October 2018, Pope Francis called a synod to consider young people, faith and vocational discernment. Drawing from the synod, he wrote an exhortation titled Christus vivit [Christ Is Alive, 2019] and addressed it to young people and to the entire people of God. Young people, he clearly notes, live in a world in crisis. They are called, he adds, to a compassion that will lead them outward to address the wounds. Both the Church and the world need the energy, enthusiasm and imagination of young people, who are not just the Church of the future but the Church

right now. They are the disciples of Jesus who carry on his mission. And, of course, a major direction for that mission is healing in various forms.

Come follow me ... and heal our world

The theme for the 2020 Annual Catholic Appeal continues the theme of the past few years - the call to discipleship, to follow Jesus. This year, the theme specifies an essential way that we follow Jesus by fulfilling his mission to bring healing to our world. Come, follow me ... and heal our world.

As we think about what the appeal supports,

something surprising becomes clear. Whether the contributions go to parishes, schools, religious education, ministerial formation, peacemaking, respect for life or even disaster relief through Catholic Relief Services, in large measure this support reaches a new generation of disciples - our young people. Even more specifically, these financial contributions contribute to their formation in parishes, schools, religious education and other initiatives in order to equip them to become the healing presence that Jesus wants in this world.

We began with a serious concern for many parents and

grandparents about the future of their children and grandchildren in our Catholic family of faith. More and more young people seem disconnected from the Church that their parents and grandparents treasure and experience as an essential resource for their lives. What can we do?

Tap idealism

A first step, I would suggest, is to tap into the idealism and sense of responsibility that so many young people already have. They know firsthand, as Pope Francis identifies it, that they live in a world in crisis, a world so much in need of healing Casa Rosada (Arge

and transformation. This is evident in their concerns for the environment, for an end to violence and for a culture that respects all people. If we can help them to connect the dots, they will see that their concerns merge with the invitation of Jesus: Come follow me ... and heal our world. We support our young people in helping them to see their call to be healing disciples in a broken world.


Another important step is for us to support the resources of education, formation and Church structures that help young people to fulfill their call to become and be healing disciples. Our financial contributions to the Annual Catholic Appeal do exactly that.

And then the last word is hope. This is how Pope Francis concluded his apostolic exhortation Christus vivit and how. I believe, we ought to conclude our own reflections: "Dear young people, my joyful hope is to see you keep running the race before you, outstripping all those who are slow or fearful. Keep running, attracted by the face of Christ, whom we love so much, whom we adore in the Holy Eucharist and acknowledge in the flesh of our suffering brothers and sisters." (299)

THE CALL TO SERVE

Bringing young people to Jesus and forming them as his disciples can happen when we invite them to serve as a healing presence. Below is a selection from Father Cameli's book, *Church, Faith, Future: What We Face, What We Can Do.*

"The diakonia, or service, in which and through which we can meet Jesus, also extends to embrace larger social concerns (in addition to caring directly for the poor, the distressed, the hungry and those wounded in any way). Upholding justice and



doing so systemically, for example, is a powerful example of service that proclaims Jesus.

"The 1971 synodal document Justice in the World states unambiguously, 'Action on behalf of justice and participation in the transformation of the world fully appear to us as a constitutive dimension of the preaching of the Gospel, or, in other words, of the Church's mission for the redemption of the human race and its liberation from every oppressive situation.'

"And beyond working for justice, our involvement in works of forgiveness, reconciliation, peacemaking, care for the environment and healing brings us and whoever would engage these works in direct contact with the living Christ. This is evident in a powerful passage from the Letter to the Ephesians:

'For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us.' (Eph 2:14)

"For people of a moral practical bent — as so many Americans are this kind of direct action and engagement is a very appropriate way to introduce people to Jesus. We bring people (and ourselves, of course) to meet him and know him in doing for others what he did for them. We also come to know him in the faces of those whom we serve, because he assured us of his presence in them. In other words, we evangelize and are evangelized in Jesus' actions, which are deeds of mercy, justice and peacemaking that become a powerful proclamation and clear introduction to him who invites us to faith. Our participation in his *diakonia* is a portal for going to see him and stay with him." (pp. 81-82)
