## **THIRST**

Each time today's Gospel story is read, I can't help but think of the many television commercials I've seen depicting perspiring athletes lifting a beverage to their lips while the scorching sun beats down on them. Our culture has definite ideas about how to quench thirst. Today, those ideas are turned upside down. The Samaritan woman operates, initially, on the TV commercial level. She asks Jesus for the flowing water so that she will not have to keep coming to the well. Jesus then talks about what real thirst is, and how he, and he alone, can quench that thirst. Lent calls us to find those places deep within ourselves where we thirst. In our thirst, as did the Israelites, we cry out to God asking for springs of living water. Deep down we know that only the Lord can satisfy these thirsts.

## **Annual Catholic Appeal FAQs**



## What does the Annual Catholic Appeal support?

The Annual Catholic Appeal supports parishes, schools, and ministries in the Archdiocese of Chicago as well as those affected by natural disasters around the world through the work of Catholic Relief Services. Funds raised from the 2018 Annual Catholic Appeal provided:

- \$4.7 million to lower-income parishes and schools. Proceeds from 2018 funded 76 parishes and 81 schools in the form of operating aid to these schools (i.e., operating grants, payroll loans, or unpaid bills).
- \$3.8 million to ministries across the Archdiocese
- \$0.5 MM to Catholic Relief Services and \$6.0 million
- \$6.0 million back to parishes in the form of rebates

## Why are we changing the current structure of the Annual Catholic Appeal?

We are changing the current structure for the following reasons:

- The current rebate structure significantly benefits a small number of parishes in high-income communities. More than 50% of rebates went to just 25 parishes with strong household incomes. With more than 1/3 of the total funds raised going back to parishes in the form of rebates, wealthy parishes are disproportionately benefiting from an appeal meant to serve lower income communities.
- Parishes in lower-income communities struggle to benefit from the current rebate program. In 2018, only 34% of these parishes were able to achieve goal.

## What are the updates to the Annual Catholic Appeal?

In 2020, for purposes of setting Annual Catholic Appeal goals, parishes whose average Household Income per U.S. Census data is below \$40,000 will have a new goal of 4% of offertory income. This includes approximately 20% of all parishes in the Archdiocese. Parishes whose average Household Income per U.S. Census data is above \$40,000 will have a new goal of 7% of offertory income.

This new structure will put rebates within reach for more parishes. It will also provide more funding for lower-income parishes and schools. This new structure is well in line with best practices at other large dioceses across the country, many of which include goals higher than 7% of annual offertory income.

There is also a new program in 2020 to share the costs of running the Appeal. In 2018, it cost \$1,459,233 to run the Annual Catholic Appeal, which is 8.8% of the total funds raised. These costs support necessary expenses such as postage, printing materials, gift processing services, and two Annual Catholic Appeal staff members. This is well within benchmark for an annual fund program. In 2019, those costs have also been reduced to \$1.2MM. These costs come directly out of the proceeds of the Annual Catholic Appeal, so every dollar

spent on costs is a one less dollar for lower-income parishes and schools.

In order to more equitably share costs, in 2020 a slightly revised rebate model will be introduced. 10% of all rebates after the first \$10,000 will go toward supporting the costs of the Annual Catholic Appeal. This model will not overly burden any parish while freeing up more donations to support lower-income parishes and schools.

## Who provided input on these updates?

These updates were implemented with input from the Presbyterial Council, Vicars, Deans, and DVOs, as well as the Annual Catholic Appeal Advisory Committee, which includes pastors and Annual Catholic Appeal donors. In 2019, a small group of parishes also piloted an updated structure that included a three-tier system. Based on feedback from all these groups, a two-tier system is being introduced across the Archdiocese in 2020.

## How will the new structure help more parishes and schools?

For lower-income parishes who have a 4% goal a rebate will be much more within reach. This will provide the parish with a better opportunity to achieve additional funds. Moving the goal from 6 to 7 percent for remaining parishes will allow a greater percentage of overall Appeal funds to be used at lower-income parishes and schools. A more equitable cost-sharing structure will also free up more funds to be used to support lower-income parishes and schools.

In the 2019 fiscal year, the Archdiocese provided \$19 million in operating aid to parishes and schools, an amount significantly higher that the net proceeds from the Appeal, so the need for Appeal funding is st'ill greater than the amount it returns to the Archdiocese. These changes will enable the Appeal to better support needy parishes.

#### How are the goals established?

The goals are established as a percentage of each parish's annual offertory income (Sundays, Holy Days, Christmas, and Easter). Parishes in zip codes with less than \$40,000 in average Household Income per

U.S. Census data will have a 4% goal. Parishes in zip codes with more than \$40,000 in average Household Income per U.S. Census data will have a 7% goal. U.S. Census data is used to establish these goals because it is standard, consistent, and transparent.

Dear Brothers,

We continue to monitor with concern the questions that are arising about the spread of Coronavirus/COVID-19. As a matter of prudence, the following guidelines, based on guidance from the USCCB Committee on Divine Worship, are to be implemented in all parishes within the Archdiocese of Chicago effective immediately.

All Priests, Deacons, Altar Servers and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion must wash their hands before Mass begins and use an alcohol based antibacterial solution before and after distributing Holy Communion.

Discern how to do this to best maintain the reverence of the Mass.

Ensure all vessels used at Mass, once purified, are thoroughly washed with soap and hot water after each use

#### **During all Masses and liturgies:**

Refrain from physical contact during the Sign of Peace (note: the Sign of Peace can be exchanged without physical contact)

Refrain from distribution of Holy Communion to the faithful via the chalice (please consider options for any parishioners with celiac disease or sensitivity)

Given the frequency of direct contact with saliva in the distribution of Holy Communion on the tongue, every consideration should be given by each individual to receive Holy Communion reverently in open hands for the time being.

- Refrain from holding hands during the Lord's Prayer.
- Refrain from using Holy Water fonts.
- Assure the faithful that if they are sick or are experiencing symptoms of sickness, they are not obliged to attend Mass, and even that out of charity they ought not to attend.

Explain when the Church allows for you to miss Mass – Catechism 2181 allows for serious reasons like illness.

Make parish or bulletin announcements encouraging best health practices.

Finally, please join in praying for all those who are sick, and perhaps add a General Intercession at Mass for those affected by coronavirus and other communicable diseases.

## Coronavirus (COVID-19) Info & Resources

As of March 2, 2020

The Archdiocese of Chicago is closely monitoring the news regarding Coronavirus/COVID-19 and actively planning for any potential circumstances. We are adhering to all guidance provided by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

Below are guidelines from the CDC for individual preventive measures and travel guidelines, as well as liturgical considerations, based on guidance from the USCCB Committee on Divine Worship, to be implemented in all parishes within the Archdiocese of Chicago until further notice. Included at the bottom of this message are links to the public health information sources - please follow the guidance of those sources for employers and schools and keep updated as conditions and best practices can change.

#### **Individual Preventive Actions**

- Stay home when you are sick and if you have a fever, stay home for at least 24 hours after your fever is gone.
- If you or a member of your household have traveled to any of the Level 2+ countries (per the CDC China,

Iran, Italy, South Korea, Japan as of March 2, 2020) between February 10, 2020 and today, alert your direct supervisor or principal so your workplace or school may take appropriate precautions (note: supervisors will receive information on how best to follow up).

- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw
  the tissue in the trash immediately and not on any
  hard surface. If tissues are not available, cough or
  sneeze into your sleeve.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.

- Eliminate open sources of shared snacks and food in the workplace.
- Stop shaking hand.
- We will distribute additional hand sanitizers at the entrances of and throughout the Pastoral Centers, and we will make anti-bacterial wipes available in all conference rooms and lunchrooms. We respectfully request that everyone use these regularly. We advise parishes, schools and agencies of the archdiocese take similar precautions for their workspaces.

#### **Liturgical Celebrations**

- All Priests, Deacons, Altar Servers and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion must wash their hands before Mass begins and use an alcohol based antibacterial solution before and after distributing Holy Communion.
- Discern how to do this to best maintain the reverence of the Mass.
- Ensure all vessels used at Mass, once purified, are thoroughly washed with soap and hot water after each use.





- Per the CDC and actions being taken by other organizations, any travelers who enter the United States after being in a level 3+ country on the CDC's travel advisory list (China, I ran, Italy, South Korea, Japan as of March 2, 2020) during the past 14 days should restrict their movements. If you are a recently-returned traveler from one of those countries and have not already been quarantined by government agencies upon return to the U.S., you are asked to closely monitor your health and practice social distancing for 14 days (note: social distancing = 6 feet or more between you and anyone else).
- All non-essential, work-related travel to level 2+ locations (per the CDC), is suspended. Please consult with your direct supervisor to best determine actions to cancel or adjust work-related travel plans.

Faith is a wonderful gift that you get at St. Francis. We go to mass on Wednesday to learn and answer questions about our faith.
