



Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

As we walk on our life journeys in this world, we may often feel overwhelmed. Struggle and suffering can mark our lives because of health issues, job insecurity, family concerns, or the painful loss of a loved one. The world itself, in Saint Paul's words, "has been groaning" (Roman 8:22), as it struggles with wars, violence, ecological degradation, economic injustice, and natural disasters. And as we are keenly aware this past year, the Church herself has struggled mightily with the shameful legacy of abuse and its mismanagement.

It seems that the landscape of our lives is entirely shaped by struggle and suffering. And that might seem to be the sum and substance of it all, but, in faith, we know that it is not. Our celebration of the Lord's Resurrection in this Easter season opens our eyes beyond this desperate landscape to a new and hope-filled horizon. There is more to the story than our struggle and suffering. In the Resurrection of Jesus, we can begin to see a new life ahead of us that God offers to us.

As we go forth in this Easter season, I am reminded of the great Psalm 118 that the Church so often prays:

I was thrust down, thrust down and falling, but the Lord was my helper. The Lord is my strength and my song; and has been my savior. There are shouts of joy and victory in the tents of the just. (vv. 13-15)

May this Easter season renew within you and your loved ones the conviction that God is your helper and an abiding awareness of your victory in the Risen Lord Jesus.

26th PLEDGE UPDATE & REPAIRS COMPLETED

Sunday, April 14, 2019
PALM SUNDAY

Dear Parishioners, Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The remaining major projects are the new flooring design in the Church. We had hoped by Christmas 2018 to have completed the new Church flooring, but our plans and finances are scheduled for 2019. A monument on the site of the first Church building will be erected in remembrance of the first church in the parish and in honor of the generations of Catholics since 1949 in this faith community as disciples of this Body of Christ. This monument is scheduled for the spring of 2019.

As pledges are made and paid, we will continue to address the one remaining project, which can be found on our parish website. See what this good parish has accomplished already in total pledges and number of donors! At this point in the Campaign, 861 donors helped us reach \$1,384,493 in total pledges. Total pledges paid are \$1,357,492. Balance due is \$27,006. It is not the intention of the Fix-It Campaign to place the parish in debt. As a parish, we spent 9 years paying off the \$3.8 million debt. We will only address the project as we raise the funds to pay. As Thomas Jefferson advised, "Never spend your money before you have it!" My Grandmother Ryan said the same message in her own way! For details on the campaign, including the presentation that was shown at Masses as well as the information on Charitable Giving Options, visit our parish website, www.stfrancislzparish.org. Thank you to those who have already responded with a pledge toward the \$1.7 million goal. St. Francis de Sales has a long history of generous giving. I respectfully ask for the prayers, involvement, and sacrifice of many, if not all, in the parish in making a pledge towards the Fix-It Campaign in addition to the generosity you provide each Sunday offering. For example, if 1,000 parishioners pledge the suggested amount of \$850 per year for 2 years, we will reach our campaign goal immediately to conclude the project. Please, everyone, participate through a prayer and a pledge. All the funds we raise in the Fix-It Campaign stay within the parish. I want to express my gratitude to Deacon John Sfire, Jason Sfire, and Amie Paige of The Fidelity Group for doing an extensive study of our parish campus, as was presented in the Fix-It Campaign presentation. I have asked the Fidelity Group, under the leadership of Deacon John Sfire and Jason Sfire, to serve as Project Managers of the Fix-It Campaign. I also want to offer my appreciation for the guidance and involvement of Tom Purtell, Chair of the Parish Pastoral Council (PPC), Marty Bush, Member of the PPC; Mike Carlino, Chair of the Parish Finance Council; Doug Samz, Member of the Parish Finance Council; Christine DePrez, Cornerstone Bank Liaison; Laura Angelini, Business Manager; and Pam Lynch, Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministries.

August 30, 2018 A Crisis - but Not of Faith

Catholics must not let scandals in the Church overshadow their trust in Christian teaching

n the ancient creed recited at Mass on Sundays, Catholics affirm their belief in "one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church." It's not difficult to imagine hundreds of thousands, if not millions, of Catholics in the U.S. choking on that second adjective over the past several months.

Grisly allegations of sexually abusive clergy in Chile, Honduras, Ireland, Great Britain, Australia and the U.S.; the former cardinal-archbishop of Washington unmasked as a serial sexual predator specializing in the degradation of seminarians under his authority; clueless and bureaucratic responses to these crimes from some bishops seemingly incapable of sharing the rage being expressed by their people; unprecedented charges of inattention to sexual abuse against a sitting pope, first leveled by furious lay Catholics in Chile and then by a retired Vatican diplomat; stonewalling in Rome; unhinged polemics across the spectrum of Catholic opinion: Where is the holiness of the Church in all of this?

Little wonder, then, that some of my fellow-Catholics have taken to the internet and the op-ed pages, not just to condemn gross failures of Catholic leadership but to confess to a crisis of faith. In this summer of nightmare, with the bad news by no means all out, the gag reflex of many Catholics is entirely understandable.

But that doesn't, or shouldn't, make it a crisis of faith.

The Catholic Church is such a large, fascinating, complex and storied institution, and Catholic life is so focused on institutions like parishes, schools and hospitals, that it's easy for serious Catholics to lose sight of something quite basic: Catholics aren't—or shouldn't be—at Mass on Sunday because they admire the pope of the day, or their local bishop, or their pastor. Catholics come to Mass on Sunday to hear what we believe to be the Word of God in Scripture and to enter into what we believe to be communion with God because of Jesus Christ.

Friendship with Jesus Christ is where Christianity begins. To learn from Christ and to be fed by him in holy communion is the primary reason for Catholic worship. If Catholics lose sight of that, the awfulness that has come to light about some of the people of the Church, at all levels of Catholic life, can cause what might seem at first blush a crisis of faith.

Yet much as I share the anger and disgust of my fellow Catholics over what has surfaced these past months, I'd suggest to those imagining themselves in a crisis of faith that they're experiencing something different: a challenge to understanding what the Church really is. As the Second Vatican Council taught in the first sentence of its most important document, the Church, first and foremost, is about Jesus Christ, the "light of the nations." Catholics trust Jesus

Christ; trust in the institutions of the Church follows from that. And when trust in the Church as an institution is broken—as it has been so many times over two millennia—it's important to refocus on the basis of Catholic faith, which is trust in Jesus Christ.

This is, in fact, a very old story. Catholics at Mass on Aug. 26 were reminded of it in the Gospel reading they heard. Although it was prescribed for that Sunday by an accident of the Church's triennial cycle of scripture readings, it seemed remarkably germane to the present moment.

At the end of the sixth chapter of John's Gospel, Jesuoths has caused a furor among his first followers by declaring himself the "bread of life," on which his friends and disciples must feed. Many found this a "hard saying," left the itinerant rabbi from Nazareth and "returned to their former way of life." Jesus then turns to his closest companions, the Twelve, and asks, "Do you also want to leave?" Peter answers in two sentences that every outraged or embittered Catholic today should pause and ponder: "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life."

That conviction is the reason to be a Catholic, the reason to stay a Catholic and the reason to bend every effort to reform the Church as an institution, so that it can be a credible witness to the Lord who offers communion with God and words of eternal life.

Fifteen years ago, during another shattering crisis of Catholic credibility, I was signing copies of my new book after giving a lecture at a Catholic parish in rural Indiana when a young couple approached me. They were much less dour than the figures in Grant Wood's "American Gothic" but were remarkably similar otherwise: honest, hardworking, uncomplicated farm folk. They said, quite casually, that reading the book's candid description of ecclesiastical corruption and fecklessness, and my proposals for reform, had finally convinced them, after years of indecision, to enter the Catholic Church during what was then the worst crisis in U.S. Catholic history. Why, I asked? Because, they said, any Church that could be this honest about what's wrong with it had to be based on the truth and on Jesus Christ.

I've thought about that couple many times these past months. Their testimony has not only helped sustain me during this annus horribilis. It has, I hope, given me a deeper insight into the nature of the current crisis and what is required for its resolution.

A Crisis - but Not of Faith - continued

Those of us who believe in God's providential guidance of the Church must wrestle with the questions, why is this awfulness going on and what are we supposed to do about it?

My answer, inspired in part by those Indiana farmers in 2003, is that the Church is being called to a great purification through far more radical fidelity to Christ, to Catholic teaching and to Catholic mission. Bishops who have failed in their responsibilities as teachers, shepherds and stewards have typically done so because they put institutional maintenance ahead of evangelical mission. Keeping the institutional Catholic machinery ticking as smoothly as possible, by compromises with truth and discipline if necessary, was deemed more important than offering others friendship with Jesus Christ and the sometimes hard truths the Church learns from Christ.

All that institutional-maintenance Catholicism must now end. There is little holiness there. Throughout the world today, the living parts of the Catholic Church are those where people have embraced Catholic teaching in full and have grasped that being a faithful Catholic means offering others the gift they have been given—friendship with Jesus Christ. These Catholics, who have been stirred to protest but have not been shaken in their faith, are those who will effect the reform the Church needs. They include those bishops, priests and lay men and women who have squarely faced the present wretchedness, who are determined to get answers to the questions that must be answered and who will not settle for that form of institutional maintenance called stonewalling—whether it comes from their local bishop in the U.S. or from Rome.


Happily, those Catholics exist in considerable numbers. This is their moment.



Proverbs 19:17 Project Recap

Michelle Rosener, daughter of Matt and Katy Roesner, is a senior at Stevenson High School and is goingo to attend Texas Christian University upon graduation. She has worked a the front desk in the Ministry Center over the past three years and has been involved with our Youth Ministry program over the past four years.

Hello! My name is Michelle Roesner and I am going to briefly speak about the homeless person project that I created a year and a half ago and executed this winter. Many of you may know about the project, however, for those who do not, my project is called the Proverbs 19:17 Project.

A few summers ago at a Steubenville Youth Conference, an event held for Christian teens across the nation, I felt an urge to step up and do more for those living on the streets. I had been thinking about ways that I could serve my community and felt a huge tug on my heart at the end of the retreat to develop a plan to help the homeless on a greater scale. The planning started as soon as I got home. I worked on my project for many hours, researching and exploring ways to help those in my community. Through my research I discovered that according to the Chicago Coalition for the Homeless, there are 64,000 homeless adults and 48,000 homeless children in Chicago alone. These staggering statistics motivated me to commit to this project and have fueled my drive. This past December, I along with many amazing volunteers, provided as many homeless people as I could with basic supplies to help them as we moved into colder months.

I created 80 Care Kits each containing:

- 1 blanket
- 4 water bottles
- 2 pairs of socks
- 1 bar of soap
- 4 tubes of toothpaste
- 2 toothbrushes
- 1 bar of deodorant
- 1 winter hat
- 1 pair of gloves

- 1 can of tuna
- 1 cup of applesauce
- 1 fruit cup
- 1 bag of trail mix
- 1 tub of peanut butter
- 12 granola bars
- 2 protein bars
- 4 bags of fruit snacks
- And 1 pop tart pack

None of this would have been possible without the generous support of this parish community. Through the generosity of many people in our parish in total we received one thousand nine hundred and sixty eight dollars and sixteen cents, one thousand seven hundred seventy six dollars and thirty three cents of this total amount was donated to Lincoln Park Community Services, a homeless shelter in Chicago.

The money that was not given to the homeless shelter was put toward buying some supplies such as large zip lock bags and a few extra hygiene products for the kits. 100% of all

monetary donations went directly to the homeless.

As for physical donations, we received 3760 items before the cutoff date. Any items that were not used directly for the kits were given to Journeys The Road Home, a homeless shelter in Palatine.

All in all, we put together 80 Care Kits over the course of three long yet rewarding days dedicated solely to sorting and packing. These Care Kits were then distributed on December 22nd with the help of many amazing volunteers. Seriously, the volunteers did a fantastic job! I am so thankful for them.

We distributed the Kits by loading up about half a dozen vehicles and driving around until we saw a homeless person. When we did, we hopped out and handed it to them with a smile and a simple Merry Christmas. The reactions we got were priceless and extremely humbling. I would love to share one with you quickly.

The second person I gave a kit to saw me walking over with the kit and his eyes completely lit up. He asked me if what I was carrying was for him and I said yes. He at first didn't realize it was anything more than a blanket, however, once I handed him the kit and he felt its weight, his eyes became glossy with tears and he was speechless. He looked completely overjoyed. I said Merry Christmas and he thanked me a million times over. I will never forget this.

This project changed my life. Behind the scenes, it was really hard work yet God willing everything got done. All of you and I made Christmas a little more cheerful for many homeless people.

I am a senior in high school and will be moving to Texas next fall so sadly I will personally be unable to carry out this project again in the future. Since this project was so successful, however, I would love to pass it on. If you know of anyone who would like to be in charge of this project in the following years, please talk to me in the gathering space.

Finally, I would like to say that this project was not my work. Sure it was my physical work; however, I was simply the hands and feet of Jesus carrying out His deeds. Many have and many will praise this project, yet, the best way to show any gratitude for this project would be to simply stay a few minutes after and pray to God thanking Him for his goodness. Again, this was simply me acting as a vessel. I ask that you thank Him for giving me drive and courage to carry out His work. That will be thanks enough in my eyes. Thank you all again and God bless!













The Divine Mercy Sunday Prayer Service will begin at 3pm at St. Francis de Sales Parish Church. Confessions will be available after the 12:30pm Mass and again after the 3pm prayer service until the 5pm Mass. All are welcome.

Why is there Divine Mercy Sunday?

Jesus appeared to St. Faustina Kowalska for the first time on Feb. 22, 1931 and gave her His first revelation about His Divine Mercy. Jesus' message is that He desires mankind to avail itself to the infinite mercy of God on earth. That is why he wanted the first Sunday after Easter to be Divine Mercy Sunday. This is not a feast day invented in the Middle Ages or thought up by the Vatican. This is a special feast because it is one asked for by Jesus Himself!

How do we avail ourselves to this Divine Mercy?

Jesus will give us complete forgiveness of sins and punishments if we do a few simple tasks. We are asked to attend Mass and receive Holy Communion on Divine Mercy Sunday. We also should say the Divine Mercy Chaplet and venerate the Divine Mercy Image on Divine Mercy Sunday. A good confession must be made 20 days before or after Divine Mercy Sunday. Not much to ask for when you consider that you receive forgiveness of sins and remission of punishment!

Why did God give us the Feast of Divine Mercy?

Jesus said to St. Faustina, "I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender Mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My Mercy. The soul that goes to Confession and receives Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day all the Divine blood gates through which grace flow are opened. Let no soul fear to draw near Me, even though its sins be scarlet. My Mercy is so great that no mind, be it man or angel, will be able to fathom it throughout all eternity. Everything that exists has come forth from the very depths of My most tender mercy. Every soul in its relation to Me will contemplate My love and mercy throughout eternity. The Feast of Mercy emerged from My very depths of tenderness. It is My desire that it is solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the fount of My Mercy." (St. Faustina Diary 699)

Easter and Divine Mercy Sunday Easter is the day that we celebrate the triumphant Jesus Christ who sacrificed His life for us and then rose from the dead. On Divine Mercy Sunday, we again are given a view of Jesus as the loving Savior. The Divine Mercy Image Painting hangs in our church on the south wall. Jesus told St. Faustina to have this image painted. It shows the red and white rays of His blood and water. He also told her to have the words, "Jesus I trust in you" written across the bottom. 
