Deacon's Corner

ood morning to all. I am not sure when you will get this. I am in the mountain village of Douar in Lebanon. I will be here until July 5th so today's and next Tuesday's DC will come sometime during the week as I get acclimated to the internet here.

Thinking of a subject for today, I have given a lot of thought about the time since the Resurrection of Jesus (Easter Sunday) and the 50 days leading up to Pentecost Sunday and the couple weeks since. It struck me as I was doing my homily on the Feast of the Blessed Trinity as to why Jesus felt it necessary to come back to visit His disciples so many times since His death on the Cross, so I decided to write about my thoughts.

Going back to the Crucifixion of Jesus on Good Friday, I felt a sadness that John was the only disciple who was at the foot of the Cross while Christ suffered and died for our sins. All the others had scattered among the countryside in fear for their lives. Remember that they had been with Jesus for three years, every day during Christ's ministry. They felt protected knowing who Jesus was, not only by His teachings but by the numerous miracles Jesus performed in their presence. I venture to say that there were many, many miracles that were never reported in the Gospels. Too many to mention. Then the disciples witnessed Jesus being tried unjustly to be put to death. This must have brought much fear over them.

But what about all that Jesus had taught them? What about the plan that Jesus had for them to "go out and teach ye all nations"? I imagine they never thought that their future would be without Jesus so their fear continued. So Jesus had to come back to them to reassure them of who He really is. I am sure you recall that Thomas was the first "doubter" when he was told that Jesus had appeared before the other disciples. But weren't they all "doubters"? It wasn't until Pentecost Sunday when Jesus appeared for the last time to call down the Holy Spirit to "dwell within them" and remain with them all the days of their lives (and ours).


So let's stop and think about this, about what took place with the disciples. Jesus told them that He would "no longer be with them" but that the Holy Spirit would be with them always to help them and guide them through their lives. And this was best defined on both Pentecost Sunday followed by the next Sunday celebrating the Feast of the Blessed Trinity, which better defined God, our Father being three-in-one. The Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

In the last homily I did on the Sunday before I left for Lebanon, I said "we are all disciples of Jesus Christ". That Jesus was not just referring to His disciples in the Upper Room, but was speaking to all of us. For if we all believe in Jesus Christ and His time here on earth, then we all have been called to evangelize His Word to all nations. So I ask the question, at least of myself, why is that so hard for us to do? What fear do we have that holds us back from telling everyone that "I believe in Jesus Christ"? Are we afraid of being judged by others? Are we afraid that we seem weak if we have to ask for His help in our times of need? And these fears are sometimes so subtle that we don't even realize we have them, but I believe, at least on some level, we all do at one time or another.

So now is the time to make a change for the better. As we all agree, our lives are full of constant changes. Some are good and some may be not so good. But they always take place, whether we want them to or not. So why not use the greatest gift we could have ever received, the gift of the Holy Spirit, who dwells within us 24/7. Always with us waiting for us to ask for help, to ask for guidance, to ask for understanding of what is taking place in our lives. I have said the only question that is a bad question is one we don't ask. The Holy Spirit is waiting for us to ask for help and assistance in our lives. So let's get over whatever fear we have and realize that "He dwells within us always" and is just waiting for us to ask.

WHY DO WE HAVE TO GO TO MASS ON SUNDAY?

"Why do we have to go to Mass?" is one of the most frequently asked questions that students address to the religion teachers, and recently I received an email from a former student asking for an article but she could share with his friends that answers that very question.

There's obviously a scriptural basis for going to Mass, but there is also a basis in human reason. The human person is the subject of a host of duties. It is the virtue of justice that dictates how he ought to respond to those duties. Firstly, he has a duty towards his equals: a duty to pay back what he borrowed, to tell the truth, a duty not to kill, etc. But he also has debts that he cannot fully repay, but which

he is required to try to repay to the fullest extent possible. For example, we have a debt to the social whole, for we have benefited from the generosity of countless others in ways that we cannot fully appreciate. It is the virtue of natural piety that inclines a person, in gratitude, to render due honor and service to the country as a whole. We have a debt to our parents that cannot be fully remitted, and it is again the virtue of filial piety that inclines us to render due honor and worship to them. But above all, we have a debt to God that cannot be fully repaid. Everything we have been given, every blessing and every human good that we enjoy comes ultimately from God, the First Cause of all that is. It is the virtue of religion, the most perfect part of the virtue of justice, that seeks to render due honor and worship to God within the same spirit of gratitude. And so it is reasonable, a requirement of justice in fact, to be religious. One is not entirely just if one is not religious.

For a Catholic, though, that's half the story. There are more weighty reasons that are offered by divine revelation. Christ came to save us. He came to save us from sin and the prospect of eternal death. He came ultimately to die

> for us: "There is a baptism with which I must be baptized, and how great is my anguish until it is accomplished!" (Lk 12,50). It is his death and resurrection that saves us. He alone could buy us back from unending death by offering his life as a ransom because he alone is divine, that is, fully God and fully man. His sacrifice on the cross is the perfect act of religion offered on our behalf, and it is this act that justifies us, redeems us, and saves us: "Indeed, only with difficulty does one die for a just person,

so perhaps for a good person one might even find courage to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us. How much more then, since we are not justified by his blood, will we be saved through him from the wrath. Indeed, if, while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, how much more, once reconciled, will we be saved by his life" (Rm 5,7-10).

But this perfect acts of religion, offered once two thousand years ago, is perpetuated until the end of time. It is represented (made present) every Mass. The Mass is a sacrifice, the same sacrifice offered on Calvary. This sacrificial act is opened up for us in order that we might enter into it, if we so choose. Christ, the eternal Son, has made his perfect offering to God the Father into real food and drink: "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day. For my flesh is true food, my blood is true drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him" (Jh=n 6, 54-56). The Eucharist is literally Christ's body and blood. A priest is one who's been given the power to change ordinary bread and wine into Christ's body and blood. He alone can say Mass, thus making it possible for us to enter into the mystery of Good Friday. And it was Christ who said: "Do this in remembrance of me" (Lk 22,19).

To sum this up, we have a natural duty to worship God in some visible way that expresses a real internal act of devotion. And this natural application of justice is further confirmed in the first three commandments of the Decalogue: "You shall have no other gods besides me".


